

Roanoke River Valley Education Consortium Partners With the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics



The Roanoke River Valley Education Consortium (RRVEC) met on May 11, 2022. The RRVEC are six small, rural, and economically challenged public school districts in northeastern North Carolina (Halifax, Bertie, Hertford, Weldon, Northampton, and Warren) that have come together on behalf of the children and families they serve.
