

Sample Licensed Interview Questions

All Interview forms should always indicate position, location, date, and who is taking notes and for whom:

As you create your list of interview questions, think about what you are trying to find out related to the person's ability to do the job. Ask a question in each of the key areas. After your candidate has initially answered, ask additional questions to further develop his or her response.

Sample PLC questions:

- 1. Tell us your personal philosophy about student learning.
- 2. We have all run into a student who simply does not want to work, but is not a behavior problem and is not interfering with the learning of others. How have you responded to that student?
- 3. One of your colleagues states that there is little a teacher can do to help a student who is just not interested in learning. How would you respond?
- 4. Please briefly share a time when you were part of a group or team that led to better results for its members and a more satisfying professional experience and think of another time when you were part of a group or team and it was a negative experience. What factors contributed to the difference?
- 5. What is your understanding of the terms "formative and summative assessment"? Please tell us of some and how you have used both forms of assessment in your teaching experience?
- 6. What role does professional collaboration play in student learning?
- 7. To insure a meeting that contributed to student learning, what items should be included on an agenda for an effective team meeting of teachers?
- 8. Give examples of how you might collect and utilize data to enhance student learning.

Sample District Improvement Plan questions:

- 1. One of our district priorities is Total Instructional Alignment. How would you incorporate this into your teaching?
- 2. What assessment systems or tools would you use to know if your students are learning and to make decisions about what to teach?
- 3. How have you assessed the reading skills of individual students in your class?
- 4. How have you accommodated students with different learning styles and skill levels in your classroom?

Sample questions about curriculum and instruction:

- 1. What are some of the basic skills in mathematics that students learn in your classroom? Describe how you have taught one of them.
- 2. What methodologies are you trained in and would you use to teach (______)?
- 3. Describe how you have integrated technology into your classroom instruction.
- 4. Describe a social studies unit you have taught.
- 5. Describe your classroom.
- 6. Describe how you would start a typical science lesson.

- 7. Describe how you have included both skills-based and whole language instruction in your reading lessons.
- 8. Describe experiences you have had team teaching or working with a grade level team.
- 9. How would you motivate a student not interested in learning (______)?
- 10. What methodologies are you trained in and would you use to teach (______)?

Sample questions about lesson planning and longer-range planning:

- 1. Tell me about your approach to planning units for your class.
- 2. How did you divide large amounts of material to be covered?
- 3. How did you decide how much is appropriate for a class? A week?
- 4. Tell me about a specific topic you taught last year. How did you organize this topic?
- 5. Tell me about your lesson planning style. How do you write a lesson plan, and what does it include?

Sample questions about classroom organization and management:

- 1. Tell me about classroom management plans that you have used.
- 2. Tell me how you establish rules of behavior in your classroom at the beginning of the year.
- 3. What rewards and consequences worked well for the students you taught? Why?
- 4. Tell me about a time when your classroom management plan worked well for you.
- 5. Tell me about a time when your management plan did not work and students misbehaved or were not motivated.
- 6. Tell me about how you reacted when a child used profanity.
- 7. Describe how your classroom is set up.

Sample questions about homework and grading:

- 1. What amounts and types of homework did you assign in the grade you taught last year?
- 2. What have you done in the past if students did not do the assigned homework?
- 3. Explain your grading system to me, assuming I am a student.
- 4. How did you communicate your grading system to parents?

Sample questions about meeting individual needs:

- 1. How will you meet the range of student abilities in your class? For example, how will you challenge an advanced and slow learner in the same lesson?
- 2. Tell me about a classroom in which you have worked with students from diverse backgrounds. What steps did you take to create an inclusive learning environment?
- 3. Tell me about a time when you worked with students who were not native speakers of English.
- 4. Tell me about your work with special needs students.
- 5. Describe the problems and stressors of students with whom you have worked. What can (or should) you do about these problems as a teacher?
- 6. Tell me about how you have promoted cultural competency in your classroom.
- 7. What are some of the instructional approaches you have used to help all children in your classroom succeed?

Sample questions about communicating with parents and colleagues.

- 1. When and how have you communicated with families? What strategies were successful? Which didn't work as well?
- 2. Describe how you have conducted conferences.
- 3. Tell me about how you have worked with volunteers in your classroom.

- 4. Share an example of communication with a parent that enabled you to better help a child in your class.
- 5. Tell me about a communication or meeting with a parent that did not go as you expected, and how you responded
- 6. Describe a time when you co-taught, planned, or collaborated with another teacher.
- 7. Describe how you have resolved a difference of opinion with a colleague.

Sample questions about professional growth:

- 1. What do you read to keep current in your field?
- 2. What conferences or workshops have you attended outside of school?
- 3. What aspect of your teacher education program do you feel best prepared you for teaching?
- 4. In what areas are you interested in developing yourself professionally? Who do you consider a mentor?
- 5. If you have a stressful day, what might you do to combat your "teacher stress"?
