MATH WEBSITES

IXL is a comprehensive, standards-aligned math program offering unlimited practice in thousands of skills. One of the best things about IXL is that students can access it from school and from home!

Each student in the district has been assigned a user ID and password by their teacher. In most cases this is the same user ID and password a student would normally use to log into school computers. To access IXL Math from home simply open a web browser on your computer and navigate to: www.ixl.com/signin/readington

After signing in, click the Practice tab to select skills to practice. You can place your mouse over any skill to see a sample question. Or, click the Awards tab to begin conquering math challenges and uncovering prizes!

Pulp Fiction

Colleen Cruz, a teacher and author who works with the Teachers College *Reading and Writing Project*, recently spoke about the role that trashy fiction plays in readers' lives. "If you were to stretch out your log of reading, there would be



some trash in there. It might be the summer beach read by Danielle Steele or Janet Evanovich, or the quick skim though *People* magazine in the supermarket aisle, but most of us naturally and easily incorporate some pulpy reading into our literary days." We need to give that same break for our student readers. Looking for a healthy balance in your children's reading diet? Read on!

Colleen Cruz stresses that readers "cannot live on <u>Anna</u> <u>Karenina</u> alone." Proficient readers naturally include a mix of reading \sim non-fiction, short articles, light reading fare, and heavier novels \sim in their literary lives. It's especially critical that we offer this mix of text to our developing readers, lest they tire and get frustrated from a diet of steady "classics". Trash reading might be considered the gateway to more hefty reading.

Categories of Trashy Fiction

- ✓ Pop Culture: Sponge Bob, Clone Wars, etc. You won't invest in these titles to save them for years and years, but should get them for the short term. They'll only be "hot reads" for a short time, and your child can pass them along to friends.
- ✓ Sports: Not Matt Christopher, but those photo-driven books about the hottest new star athletes. There's little print, but great photos and captions to capture students' interest.
- ✓ Graphic Novels: Hardy Boys and Goosebumps, to name a few, are some of the books now available as graphic novels – or, comic book text – as we might recognize it. Don't dismiss these so easily. Readers need to read left to right, up and down, shaky bubbles and plain bubbles, and interpret the pictures. There's lots of inference work and synthesis work as readers pull all these strategies together.
- ✓ Gross Out Books: Such as, <u>Grossology</u> (a non-fiction book), <u>The Bathroom Reader</u>, and R.L. Stine's <u>Rotten Stuff</u>. Allow your parent sensibilities to decide which titles you will allow and which ones you won't.
- ✓ Books with Cool Covers: Sparkly, silvery covers act just like fancy gift wrap to attract readers. Some of the *Star Wars* books have these, and be sure to check out <u>Legend of Spud Murphy</u> by Eoin Colfer, author of <u>Artemis Fowl</u>.
- ✓ Joke Books: These books showcase word play, sarcasm, subtlety, and inference. Better for comprehension than we would probably acknowledge.

- ✓ Genre: Subject matters of horror, humor, and science fiction are big draws for readers.
- ✓ Magazines: MAD Kids, Sports Illustrated for Kids, Boys Life

Degrees of Building

Know the next "less trashy" level of book to recommend. Librarians can help with this. For example, first grade readers might start with <u>Super Fly Guy</u>, go to <u>Minnie and Moo</u>, then <u>Elvis the Rooster</u>, to <u>Henry and <u>Mudge</u>. Adult readers might start with *PEOPLE*, then read some Danielle Steele, then Nicholas Sparks, then <u>An</u> <u>American Wife</u>, and finally <u>Anna Karenina</u>. As long as our children don't spend all of their reading time immersed in trashy literature, they're sure to be honing their comprehension skills on a variety of reading.</u>
