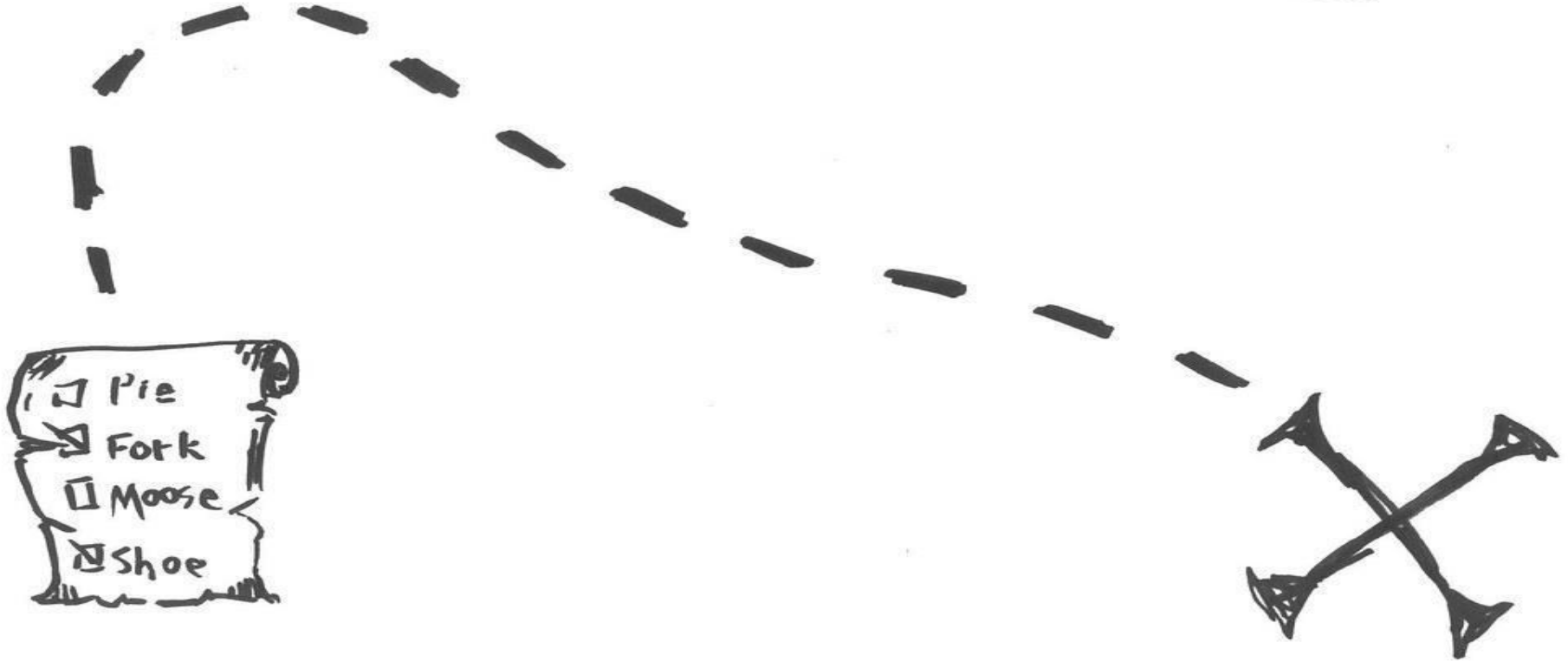


# Scavenger Hunt



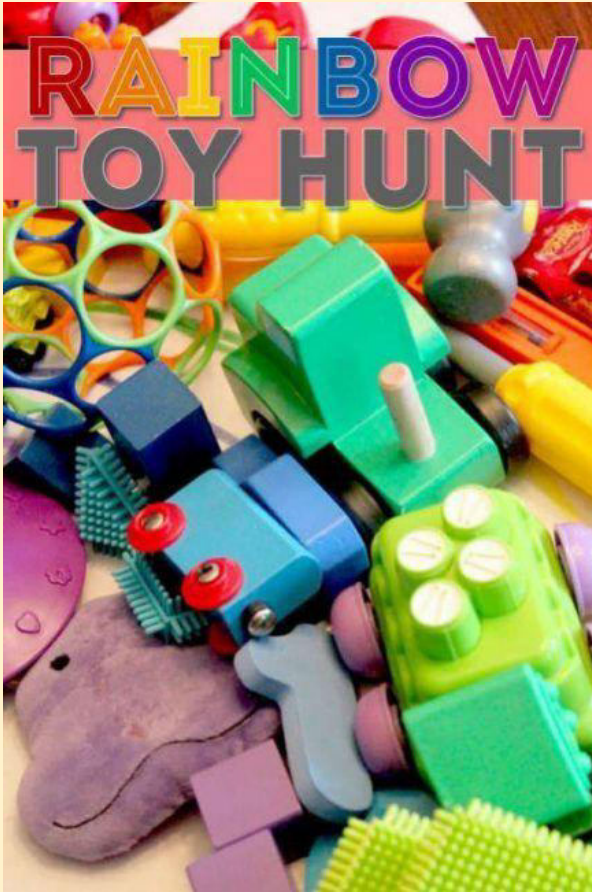
## Here is What You Will Need:

- Preferred toys of various sizes
- A list of the toys that your child will
- Enough space for movement (living room, basement, outdoors)
- String



## To Set Up:

- While your child is busy in another room (maybe doing classwork for e-learning) take your selected items and hide them in places around your home or outside space.
- Avoid places that may be too high and your child would have to climb to reach



- Hide items in different rooms of the house to make searching more difficult
- Or in the same space to make searching easier
- Select specific colored items for your child to find
- Have items placed in low and high locations (but not too high that it's dangerous)

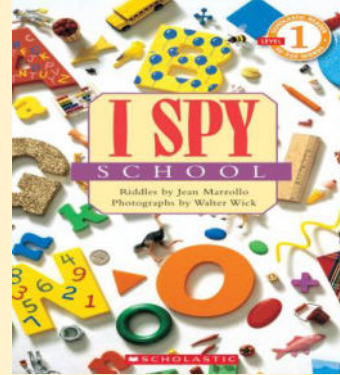


- Play the 'Hot and Cold' game
  - when your child gets closer to an item say warmer and when they get further from an item say colder
- Create clues to help your child find the item
  - For Example: This toy likes to swim (toy is hidden in a sink or bathtub)



## Modifications:

- Tie a string to each toy and have your child follow the string from toy to toy to find them all
  - Make the string go under, over, and around objects
- Play 'I SPY'
  - Sitting on your couch describe a toy or object in the room and have your child find it and bring it back to you
  - Or, you can walk around with them to find each item after saying, "I spy something \_\_\_\_"



Remember, you can always use prompting and hand over hand assistance!
