Students who are ill with fever and respiratory symptoms will be isolated in these rooms with a mask and sent home. After the student leaves the respiratory illness room, this area will be sanitized by staff disposing of any tissues/objects left behind, and the area cleaned using disinfectant and/or disinfecting fogger as needed.

Emergency Plan or Emergency Operations Plan OAR 581-022-2225	All schools have an Emergency Plan based on the Jefferson County Emergency Operations Plan. We also maintain a strong working relationship with The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Indian Health Services, Warm Springs Police, and EMS. There is annual training in <i>Safe Schools</i> and a minimum of six staff members who are present during any given day are aware of the plan and are able to execute the operation of the emergency plan. In addition, each school has emergency bags with supplies located at the front office.

509J Jefferson County School District has a school counseling framework with guidelines for student well-being and mental health resources available daily. Posters with QR codes to schedule appointments with mental health and drug & alcohol counselors are located throughout the schools. In addition, there are bulletin boards and information areas with handouts for students on Mental Health and Wellbeing. The 509J staff prioritizes student health and safety, recognizing that some students have basic needs that need to be met before educational goals can be met. The Family Access Network staff, homeless liaison, and cultural liaisons help meet the basic needs of students. All staff are trained on Trauma Informed Care & Practices, Social Emotional Learning and can refer students to counseling if there is a need.

Staff training includes 321 Insight Social and Emotional training and Emotional Learning & utilizes Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) for all grade levels.

In addition, our school-based health center partnership with Mosiac Medical at MHS and IHS at Warm Springs provides additional support and care. Our onsite counseling through a partnership with Bestcare allow students free, and easily accessible access to mental health and addiction care.

We recognize the disproportionate impact of disease on Black, American Indian/Alaska Native, Latino & Pacific Islander students & families. We also recognize that disease disproportionately impacts students with disabilities, students living in rural areas & students and families navigating poverty and houselessness. Our Equity Lens is a tool that can also be used to screen for these health disparities in our student population. Using the information we receive by words from students, staff, and community liaisons, we will address each situation that is brought to our attention individually.

Planning for and implementing proactive health and safety mitigation measures assists schools in reducing communicable disease transmission within the school environment for students, staff, and community members. 	CDC, OHA, and ODE recommend COVID-19 vaccination for all eligible individuals. The mandatory educator vaccination rule is also implemented throughout the school district.

Students with coughs are encouraged to wear a mask to help reduce the potential for spreading respiratory infections. In addition, we provide additional instructional supports to effectively wear face coverings and a positive behavior support approach to wearing face coverings during annual training. 509j school district may align with state/local rules regarding the implementation of mask-wearing at schools.

Airflow and Circulation	The 509j School district added MERV-13 air filters to all buildings and Hepa Filters are scheduled to be maintained and replaced as necessary to ensure proper functioning of the system. All intake ports that provide outside air to the HVAC system should be cleaned, maintained and cleared of any debris that may affect the function and performance of the ventilation system. On days that are 60 degrees Fahrenheit or warmer, windows may be opened to increase ventilation. When possible windows on busses are encouraged to be opened for airflow and circulation. 	We have the ability to limit cohorting in times of a communicable disease outbreak. Classrooms have maximum occupancy posters that indicate the number of individuals allowed in the room for safe social distancing. In addition, floor markings may be measured and added in areas as needed to provide for safe social distancing if required.

Physical Distancing	Social Distancing may be encouraged or required during a communicable disease outbreak as directed by JCPH, CDC, OHA, ODE. Physical distancing recommendations are to be considered when determining classroom capacity and class size. Calculations will be made with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up require the use of all space. Each classroom will maintain the maximum occupancy poster with considerations made for entry, exit, and movement.

Hand Washing	Handwashing and respiratory etiquette are encouraged and taught throughout the school year. Soap, water, and paper towels are provided in classrooms, common areas, and all restrooms. Posters demonstrating proper handwashing etiquette are posted in the restrooms. Handwashing is encouraged after coughing, using the restroom, before/after meals, and before/after sports or recess. Hand Sanitizer is located in the hallways and bathrooms and classrooms. The 509j School District follows ODE, OHA, and CDC guidelines for handwashing and use of hand sanitizer in the schools.

All staff have annual training in <i>safe schools</i> for specific topics related to their roles and responsibilities. In addition, the health aides at each school are able to help provide access to additional training and education based on the CDC, ODE, and OHA recommendations. The district nurse in partnership with public health will assist in maintaining communication throughout the district and maintain healthy operations and is available to answer questions from families, public health, and staff. The district nurse will also be responsible for contacting administration, public health, and families, in the event of a staff or student with a reported restrictable disease as defined by OAR 333-019-0010. The district Communications Coordinator assists with communication through Email, Phone Calls, Newsletters, Social Media, District Website, and School Websites. Annual training exercises are conducted by the district nurse through conversation and other reviews with information and copies of the plan are placed in all front offices and available online through shared documents online. This ensures that individuals named in the plan are aware of their roles and responsibilities during a communicable disease event. Updates to the plan will be made annually and any updates or Exercises can also help identify gaps in the planning, thereby building upon and strengthening the plan over time.
