Back-to-School Events

Elementary Schools

The 2019-20 academic calendar features two elementary student assessment days prior to the first day of school. On Wednesday, Aug. 28 and Tuesday, Sept. 3, K-5 teachers will conduct individual reading conferences with students. The early assessment will help teachers determine the instructional reading level of each student, set academic goals and design effective personalized instructional.

Families have received information from their schools with teacher assignments and instructions for signing up for a 30-minute assessment conference appointment.

Back-to-school events will be held in conjunction with elementary early assessment days. Parents and students will meet school staff, visit classrooms, set up lunch accounts, discuss health concerns with nurses, learn about their PTAs and more.

The first day of school for K-5 students is Wednesday, Sept. 4.

Preparing students for life

Preparing students for the future is no small task. Bloomington Public Schools is committed to preparing all students to graduate with the needed knowledge, skills and attitudes to succeed in a career that fits their interests, talents and goals.

The Personal Growth Plan (PGP) is our system for helping students and parents monitor progress and goals through the school years and prepare for post-high school plans. Each student’s PGP includes:

- Academic indicators like grades, test scores, attendance and academic goals.
- Learning success skills like goal setting, time management, personal strengths and financial literacy.
- Career and college planning like career interest inventories, resume tools and course planning (grades 6-12).

Students start their PGPs in middle school, focusing on school success strategies and personal strengths and beginning

career exploration. Throughout the high school years, PGP activities focus on life skills and academic planning. Career and college planning includes learning about career fields and types of postsecondary education and training, including traditional four-year colleges, technical or trade colleges, apprenticeships, on-the-job training and military service. Students have many opportunities to earn college credits in high school with AP, dual enrollment, online, Career and College Academy, post secondary enrollment options (PSEO), technical training and apprenticeships. Last

year’s seniors graduated with a combined 3,700 college credits, plus potential credit for AP classes. Students also have opportunities for internship or mentorship experiences in high school, which helps them connect what they’re learning to their goals. The work world is rapidly changing. Many in-demand jobs today don’t require a four-year degree. By aligning high school courses and activities with a career interest area, students can choose the postsecondary education or training that best fits with their goals.

Check student info in the Hub

In preparation for the start of school, parents and students are encouraged to log into the Hub to view important back-to-school information. The Hub, a password-protected website, provides easy access to homework, calendar, classroom sites, school news, attendance and bus information. To log in to the Hub, visit login.isd271.org. School lunch PINs, class schedules, and locker numbers and combinations if they are assigned by the school are all available now. School bus routes and pick-up/drop-off times are available, but note that these may change slightly up to the start of school. Hub usernames are emailed to families with an email address on file several times before the start of school. To update your email address with the district, log in to Infinite Campus and provide your contact information and preferences.

Convenient care for students

Health Commons at Pond, 9600 3rd Ave. S, is a free clinic serving students and families on Mondays and Wednesdays, from 2-6 p.m. The clinic offers a variety of care and services, including sports physicals, health screenings and referrals, mental health support, care for infections and other minor illnesses. Immunizations are available to patients with state insurance or no insurance. Care is provided by nurse practitioners, faculty and nursing students in partnership with Minnesota State University Mankato Graduate School of Nursing. Additionally, all school health offices are staffed during the school day with licensed nurses.

A new two-hour delay will be an option for district administration in the event severe weather—fog, snow, ice and extreme cold—creates hazardous conditions for transporting students to school. Previously, the district considered two options: canceling classes and programs or operating as normal. The district also initiated early release when weather conditions worsened as the day progressed.

Further details on how the two-hour delay will impact students, families and staff will be provided in the next issue of School Pages, along with other communication to families.

Indian Mounds and Poplar Bridge elementary schools will introduce a new Computer Science Immersion program this year. The program aims to empower students with skills and knowledge necessary for success in the 21st Century: creativity, collaboration, communication, persistence and confidence in dealing with complex, open-ended problems. Introducing computer science concepts in the early grades expands opportunities for girls, lower income youth and students of color who are typically under-represented in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) fields.

In response to safety concerns, access to all school playgrounds and playfields are limited to Bloomington Public Schools students during the hours of 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. each school day. Before- and after-school programs run between the hours of 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., including Kids' SAFARI and Galaxy.

School playgrounds and playfields may be used by the general public when students in school and district-run programs are not present. Signs with language to this effect are now posted at school sites. Additional exceptions are allowed in summer months when district programs are limited to a few school sites.
