- 5. In the chaos of logging in for the first time I check to see who can follow my directions the best. - 6. The first time is the hardest after that they will either remember on their own or have someone nearby to help.


Rules that Helped Me

- 4. If you do not share you will get your iPad taken.


Be consistent and strict at first so they will know that you are not playing. Have at 5 paper quizzes ready just incase.


Creating Quizzes With Google Form

- go to "google forms" and pick the quiz template.
 (Make sure you use your school google account so it will be an easy transfer.
- 2. Change the "Untitled" to the title of your quiz/assignment.




3. Type in your first questions. You can also add pictures when you hover over the picture insert.






- 4. You can add answers by clicking "add options" and "and another option"

7. Click on the right side at the bottom to separate each portion. Then press the + button at the top to add another question.





Look at the preview of the quiz before you administer it. You can do that by pressing the "eye" button so you can go through the quiz as your students would.

Use google drawing to create pictures for your quizzes.


- 1. Go to google drawing.

They have comprehension quizzes at the end that will automatically update your gradebook.


Kahoots

Create a game


Tell them to type in "kahoot.it join" in their search box and then they will be asked to put in a code.
