- Provide a quiet space and time for your child to work on the packet.
- Help your child with the directions.
- Provide assistance when needed when your child is reading.
- Provide positive feedback and praise for sincere effort.
- If your child is just beginning to learn to write independently, encourage him/her to write and spell as best as he or she can.
- Encourage daily reading of 20-30 minutes of a self-selected book. Read to your child,
 listen to him/her read, or share the reading. Record the books read on the independent reading log attached at the end of the packet.

Prairie Dog Homes

Prairie dogs live in a home under the ground.

Their home is called a **burrow**.

Team Work


Prairie dogs work together to dig their burrow.

They use their sharp claws to dig.

First they dig a hole.

Then they push the dirt out of it.

The dirt piles up into a big mound.



Tiny Tunnels

The prairie dog burrow
has tunnels and rooms.
Prairie dogs dig tunnels
just wide enough for them
to fit through. They also
dig a second entrance for
quick escapes from predators.


Rooms for Different Uses

The rooms are wider.
They have different uses.
There is a room for sleeping and a room for storing food.
There is even a bathroom!
Near the top, there is a listening room.

Why do you think prairie dogs have a listening room?

Answer: Prairie dogs have a listening room so they can stay safe below the ground while they listen for predators.


Inside a Prairie Dog Burrow





The Grizzly Bear






Small tail

They only live in North America.




North America

Helen had no way to speak until she was 7. Then she began to learn sign language.




Annie Sullivan taught Helen to spell words with her hands. She even went to college with Helen.



Helen loved horseback riding. She believed that blind and deaf people could do almost anything.






She helped other blind and deaf people learn to read. Here she is with an alphabet for the blind.
