# I. Sentence Errors: COMMA SPLICES, RUN-ONS, and FRAGMENTS

**Directions:** USE PENCIL. Correct each of the following sentence errors using the best possible revision.

1. <u>Comma Splice</u>: A comma splice occurs when two or more sentences (complete thoughts) are joined together, or "spliced," with a comma but without a joining word.

#### Comma Splice Pattern: (Sentence), (sentence).

**<u>Ex</u>**: Tommy went to the store, he bought noodles, tofu, and wok oil for his stir-fry.

2. <u>**Run-On**</u>: A run-on sentence is <u>**NOT**</u> a sentence that is too long. A run-on sentence occurs when two or more sentences (complete thoughts) are joined together *without* the proper punctuation or a joining word (and, but, or, while, when, because, etc.). Basically, one sentence "runs on" into the next.

## Run-On Pattern: (Sentence) (sentence).

**Ex:** The article was about Helen, a farmer, who grows vegetables her food is delicious, nutritious, and affordable.

3. **Fragment:** A fragment is an incomplete sentence; it's basically a group of words that is meant to be a correct sentence but is *not*; usually, a fragment lacks a *complete subject* or a *complete verb*; sometimes a fragment is missing some other necessary part of a complete thought.

## Fragment Pattern: (Incomplete sentence).

**Ex:** Because Mark, a skilled mechanic, patched the tires, greased the chain, and tightened the pedals, which were loose.
