

Happy September! I hope everyone is enjoying the return of their kiddos to our school. I know we at North Star are excited to have everyone back for another year of learning and activities.

For our elementary parents, you will probably be seeing some pretty big changes in the grades that come home to you this year. To communicate the actual knowledge that your children have acquired in a more meaningful way, we are changing report cards and in many classes the way that assignments are graded. The reason is give you a better representation of what your child does and does not have mastered. In Montana, we have standards that we are required to meet as a public school. At each grade level, students should obtain certain skills and knowledge, and those skills and knowledge will be built on in subsequent grades. On our new report cards, and many assignments you may see, students will be graded on their ability to show their mastery of each of those standards.

The new report cards will look different, and will also come with a key that will hopefully help you be able to know what each of the standards entails. There are four levels of knowledge (and an X if that skill or knowledge has not been assessed) that we will assign to a student, and they are:

- 4 Exceeds grade level expectations of standards
- 3 Secure; Independently uses and understands concept/skill or given standard
- 2 Developing; Uses and understands concept/skill with support for given standard
- 1 Beginning; Is at the initial stage of understanding concept/skill for given standard
- X Not assessed at this time

You may see this on some assignments as well. So, by combining this scale information with the standard that your student is working on, it should give you detailed information about whether they are obtaining the knowledge that they will need to move on to future classes, and beyond our schools. Hopefully it will also give you some detailed knowledge of what areas may need some extra work for your students as well.

This system will be rolled out in grades K-6 this fall. Many of you who have had students in Mrs. Lipp's Kindergarten class have seen something very similar already being used by her. We expect that there may be some questions about how the grades work and what they mean at first, and we will be happy to answer any questions. When questions arise, please call or email your child's classroom teacher, as they are the person with first-hand knowledge of your child and their grades. Also, we may adjust along the way to make the system work better. More information will be available at both the fall open house and during parent-teacher conferences, so please don't be afraid to inquire about the grading system if you have any questions.

North Star Staff and students spent some time on their first day of school learning about each other by playing "Human Bingo." Questions ranged from summer activities, to travel and foreign languages, to favorite foods like pizza. Everyone was scrambling to fill in their "Bingo cards" so that they would be eligible to win a prize. A great time was had by all, and we did find out some interesting things about each other. The 7th grade students got their feet wet in the science lab this morning as they began work learning how to measure mass of objects with a 3-beam balance. Not only did they learn how to

measure mass directly with the balance, they learned how to find the mass of a liquid by subtracting the mass of the empty beaker from the mass of the beaker

filled with water. The third aspect of finding mass is to weigh an empty dish, then increase the reading on

the scale by 5g. When they add enough salt to cause the balance to equalize, they will then have collected the necessary 5 grams for their experiment. This is only the first part of their becoming familiar with the lab equipment. In the upcoming days, they will be learning how to use a graduated cylinder to measure the volume of liquids and irregular solids through the process of water displacement. Experiments measuring temperature and length will follow. The students are excited to get into the lab and have been working hard to learn everything they can. "WE LOVE SCIENCE!!" is our motto! What a great year we are

North Star FCCLA Finds Unlimited Possibilities in Nashville

Three North Star FCCLA members joined over 8,000 members and advisers from across the United States at the 72nd annual Family Career and Community Leaders of America National Leadership Conference in Nashville, TN over the 4th of July. We were fortunate to be able to hold our conference and the competitions in the new Music City Center which is a state of the art facility and the centerpiece to a re-building project in downtown

Nashville. Members listened to inspiring speakers, attended workshops, participated in leadership training and completed at the national level in events related to Family Consumer Sciences education. The theme of this year's conference was "Unlimited Possibilities." Members were challenged to think outside the box, challenge themselves to try new things and take advantage of every opportunity that they came across. Attending from North Star were Chelsea Donaldson and Grace Farinas who competed in "Sports Nutrition"

where they developed a comprehensive improvement plan for a student athlete after tracking the athletes' eating habits, exercise, hydration and sleep patterns for a week. The plan they developed was based on research of basic needs of a high school athlete and included an exercise program, an eating plan, hydration plan and sleep plan that was tailored to the athlete they studied. They also had to figure out a way to track the athlete's progress. The girls earned a silver medal for their efforts. Hali Kapperud was elected as the FCCLA State President in March and attended the National Advanced Leadership Academy with officers from across the nation. As State President, Hali had the opportunity to present the Montana state flag at the opening ceremonies and hand out awards at the recognition session.





North Star FCCLA members had the unique opportunity to celebrate Independence Day in downtown Nashville with 200,000 plus visitors. Highlights of the day included a free concert called "Let Freedom Sing" with guests like the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Chris Young and the O'Connor Family Band who played with the Nashville Symphony to end the evening. The North Star Teachers and Staff support the notion that learning is enhanced with sufficient sleep. Students learn best when they have had enough sleep and aren't overly tired at school. Elementary aged children need more sleep than the upper classes (see chart below).

You can help your child get a restful night of sleep by creating a bedtime routine that may include any or all of the following: reading, bathing, brushing teeth, talking about your day, snuggling, or more. Your child will sleep best if they have no screen time (including phones, iPads, TV, etc.) for at least an hour before bedtime. Aim to start your bedtime routine at the same time each school night.
