We Have Been Keeping Busy

The school year continues to be great, with student engagement and staff involvement at an all-time high. The positive atmosphere in our school is phenomenal, and it involves everyone. There are great things going on in our classrooms, and the environment and attitudes reflect that positive energy. I want to tell the students and staff to keep up the great work!

Part of the reason for the great environment is the professional development that our staff has been involved in over the summer and early in the school year. We had staff attend the PLC Conference in St. Charles, Missouri, and the Schoology Conference in Chicago over the summer. Four staff members went to the ITEC Conference in Des Moines in mid-October. On October 19th we had Todd Whitaker, one of the leading speakers in education, come to Dunkerton and present to 400 teachers from the area, including our entire staff, as well as the staff from Jesup, Janesville, Tripoli, and Sumner-Fredericksburg. There were 11 other schools that sent small groups to learn from Mr. Whitaker. It was an engaging, entertaining, and thought-provoking day in which he shared with us his 17 things that "Great Teachers Do Differently". It was an afternoon with tons of great take-aways.

We are always looking at ways to improve our website and communication. If you have any suggestions, please let an administrator know, and we will see what we can do to make improvements. We are constantly working to keep students, parents, and community members apprised of happenings and upcoming events at our school. As easy as that sounds, it really is a monumental task and one that we constantly work to improve upon.

There has been much talk about when the 1921 building is scheduled to come down. The answer is in 2019 or 2020 when we call our bonds and can re-issue new bonds to pay for the demolition and reconstruction. We could do it earlier, but that would mean we would have to re-bond. That would be an expensive proposition

and one that is not necessary at this time. The Fire Marshall gave us until 2019, we are in a position to pay off our GO bonds in 2019, and we can then re-bond without raising taxes. That is what seems to make the most sense from a fiscal standpoint. Let me know if you want to talk more about this or have another idea.

The District is selling some of its used computers. See the ad later in the article on how to buy and what \$50 will get you. These computers are about 3 years old. Many students have already purchased some and have said they are working great. Stop into the Central Office to pick one up if you are interested. We will also sell some of the second floor items in the future. One of the first items will be the lockers. We will be selling them in blocks. They will be \$2 per locker for the smaller blocks, and \$1.50 for the larger blocks. A block of 10 lockers will cost \$20; a block of 24 lockers will cost \$36. Stop in to see if they will fit your needs. We are taking our time and trying to move slowly so as to not make this an "all consuming" project for our staff.

Thank you for your support in making Dunkerton a great place to live and Dunkerton Schools a great place to be a kid! As always, thanks to the taxpayers of our community for supporting the school; we couldn't do it without you!

HS Cross Country

The 2015 CXC season was a success. The cross-country team accomplished some major goals this season: bring home a second straight conference championship and qualify a team to the state meet.

At the conference in Waverly, the boys won by the closest of margins, beating Colo Nesco by a tie breaker going to the 5th place finisher on the team, Will Brown. Four runners made all conference: Jordan Yessak, John Davis, Peter Kauten, and Ben Reams.

The three girls on the high school squad could not run as a team; therefore, the goal was to set and break the new 5K record. First Alecia Kimball and then Sarah Heideman set the school record and lowered their times with Kaitlin O'Hara just behind.

The junior high team of nine runners had much success with Riley Tisue winning the conference championship.

At the District meet in Cedar Falls, the boys finished 3rd, beating 4th ranked West Fork to advance to state. Taking 1st place overall was Jordan Yessak, who also won 2 other meets this year and set a school record of 16:02. Other members of the boys varsity team were Mitch Winkers, Cole Heiple, and Alex LeBlanc.
