

Building Bright Futures

Kingston has four robotics teams, each coached by a student leader - Jalen DeClue, Ryan Garcia, Hayden LaGrand, and Lucas Inman. These student leaders are returning team members, so they are the most knowledgeable about building, programming, and competing in tournaments. Three out of the four are currently studying robotics at Unitec under Mr. Nichols. These leaders are responsible for training all new robotics students and guiding them through building for this year's game challenge.

In VEX Robotics, there is a new game challenge every year so our teams must create a new design that can successfully meet the needs of the game in order to score points and win the match. This year's game challenge is titled "Spin Up". Teams score by picking up 5.5-inch diameter discs that can be launched or placed into scoring game zones, as well as a few other scoring methods. It is important to mention that there are no building instructions for these robots. Students must study the game and

engineer and program a robot that can't meet the challenge. At competitions, students must also be interviewed by judges to make sure they participated in the engineering and design of their robot. They must also communicate with students from other schools because they work together as alliance partners during each match.

Returning Robotics sophomore Dayne Shmeiderer has already been enjoying class this year. Shmeiderer likes that this course allows you to "develop an engineering mindset and it's hands on, so you can be more creative."

Mrs. Gill, who is in charge of the robotics team, expresses that she is simply a facilitator and that her more knowledgeable students are the ones who lead the class. Shmeiderer says, "I like having students as teachers because they've been in your position more recently, and they offer a different perspective."


This month in Fall Sports


