


Making Shadows from Everyday Objects into a Cast of Playful Characters

Making shadow puppets on a wall is a childhood game we're all familiar with, but Belgian filmmaker and artist Vincent Bal turns it into an art form.


His playful shadow art illustrations are made by combining shadows cast from everyday objects with hand-drawn doodles to create a variety of charming characters.

“Now I can’t help seeing things in shadows and everyday objects,” Bal explains. On Instagram, the artist has amassed a huge following for his hundreds of doodles.








A humorous play of shadows that evokes a world of imagination.

By using the shadows of everyday objects, Bal creates highly original and quirky images










The shadow of a film canister becomes a forbidding tower, or the filaments of a lightbulb cast a dramatic backdrop as a staircase for a daring escape. Bal makes many of his images available as prints.


