- 4. Explain the following quote, in your own words: "All came forth to move in procession before the people's eye, and to impart a much-needed dignity to the simple framework of a government so newly constructed" (219).
- 5. What piece of unwelcome news does the master of the ship have for Hester? Why would Chillingworth want Hester to know his plan?! (p. 223)
- 6. What is particularly noticeable about Dimmesdale's manner as he walks in the procession?
- 7. Where does Hester stand during the procession and during Dimmesdale's sermon in the church?
