Preschool Learning Night:

the Viking Activity Center will open this summer!

A cornerstone of the N-K school district lies in its commitment to students and community as a whole. We are incredibly proud to introduce this new climate-controlled indoor facility to provide athletic, fitness, recreational, and community experiences that encourage active and healthy lifestyles. The best part is it's for EVERYONE in our local communities!

The Viking Activity Center contains 38,554 square feet of athletic/fitness, recreation, and community meeting spaces across two levels. The center will fulfill space needs and ease scheduling conflicts for N-K student physical education, athletics, and youth/community fitness and athletics.

The vision for the center easily grew to become a community space for ALL ages to experience, and to encourage and support varied healthy lifestyle journeys! An exciting addition to the center is the Multi-Purpose Community Room and kitchenette, available to anyone in local communities for gatherings, meetings, celebrations, or educational programs.

To ensure effective oversight of the facility and delivery of safe, family-friendly facilities and programming, year-round membership support and facility rentals are crucial. We currently offer a variety of memberships, or a daily pass, all which provide access to the facility and includes:

- Indoor Track (Approx. 11 laps = 1 mile)
- 2 Full Length Basketball Courts (with Volleyball Standards Available)
- Weight Lifting Area
- Cardio Fitness Area (Treadmills, Stationary Bikes, Elliptical Machines)
- Wrestling Room
- Men's & Women's Locker Rooms for community use (showers available)
- Synergy Physical Therapy consultation/appointments
- 30x40 Multi-Purpose Community Room with attached Kitchenette (additional rental fee applies)
- Staffed front reception desk





It's hard to believe that the we are already in the final quarter of the school year! After two years of cancelled / scaled-down events, it has certainly been an eventful, *successful* year in the N-K Band Department as things return to "normal."

Just over 100 students in grades 5-12 currently participate in the Northwood-Kensett Band program. This year's 5th Grade Band is actually the largest group of beginners we've had in several years!

The High School Band has class daily, while the 7th/8th Grade Band, 6th Grade Band, and 5th Grade Band meet every other day (2-3 times a week). All Band students also have weekly individual or partner lessons.

Over the course of the year, all of the different ensembles (grades 5-12) typically prepare a combined total of over 30 performances! This includes traditional concerts, pep band, marching band, ceremonies, etc. Best of all, the majority of these performances are FREE! We'd love to share our work with you! Mrs. Koenig and I often say that some of N-K's best kept "secrets" are the artistic and musical talents of our students!

All-State Auditions

Earlier this fall, Kenny Conlin ('24) and Isabella Hoch ('22) prepared auditions for the 75th Annual Iowa All-State Band. Bella and Kenny prepared two challenging etudes, a solo excerpt, all 12 major scales, as well as the chromatic scale. They both showed tremendous growth throughout the audition process!



Hello again, Vikings!



It seems too strange to be true, but it's time again for me to work to end the year for our Seniors and other students, and start planning ahead for next year. This includes modifying students' 4- Year plans for next year, Concurrent Enrollment & PSEO registration, orientations for 5th & 6th grade students, transition for 8th grade into 9th grade, and once again finalizing the Master Schedule. With the transition to a middle school model and some new staff members, there will be a fair amount of change to our school building next year.



There will be new Language Arts electives offered next year. Mr. Leo Frost will teach Sports Literature and Mythology, while Mrs. Allison Clark will teach Books to Movies and Horror, Mystery, Fantasy, and Science Fiction.



Because we're adding a new grade level to our building, we are adjusting our physical education offerings: Weightlifting & Personal Wellness are being discontinued to make room for middle school gym, while Mr. Kessel will teach updated Health classes to high school students. The Business department will be adding a computer science & coding class. A lot of thought and effort has been given to make next year's schedule the best it can be for the students in our district. There may be a few more exciting adjustments yet to come!



The 4 Year plan review schedule will come out very soon. Students will each be scheduled for a ten minute time appointment with me to review the four-year plan I have on file to make changes for next year and make sure that they are still "on track" for graduation in four years. I will send notification to families when schedules have been added to JMC and are ready for online review.



We are almost finished with eighth grade's creation of their Four Year Plans in Guidance 8. When all have been submitted and reviewed by me, I will be sending home copies for parents to review and sign. An email confirmation is also an accepted form of approval, especially in times like these!



6th grade's tour of the secondary building has been set for the morning of May 5th, and 5th grade will visit on the morning of May 12th. Elementary Guidance

As we approach the end of the school year, we are working hard on preparing students for the skills and information that they will need for the next school year.

Kindergarten - 2nd Grade: Students have been working on social skills with Shana Butler. Honesty has been a large focus throughout the month of March. In April they will begin to focus on decision making skills.

3rd Grade: Students are focusing on Mental Health and will be creating an individual self-care plan.

4th Grade: Students are working with Mrs. Butler as they wrap up their unit focusing on the effects of tobacco use.

5th & 6th Grade: Students will be focusing on lessons that will help prepare them for middle school.

Middle School Transitions

Ms. Dakota Hansen has been working with Mrs. Amy Hansen to find ways that will best prepare our 5th and 6th grade students to transition to the Middle School next year. In guidance class, students will be discussing topics such as

Academic acceleration is one of the cornerstones of gifted education practices, with more research supporting this intervention than any other intervention for gifted individuals. It is a formal process of a student skipping a grade level in either one subject area or all subject areas. The acceleration process involves multiple data collection, cognitive and above grade-level achievement testing, and review of academic, developmental, and social-emotional data.

Acceleration is an option for any student who demonstrates readiness and whose needs cannot be met within available grade level options. This accelerated coursework is a better match for the student's abilities.

The benefits of a rigorous course load are well-studied students. Students who take advanced courses are more likely to graduate from high school, enroll in college, and earn an associates or bachelors degree in less time (saving more money). For students moving directly into careers or technical degrees, the skills learned in advanced classes (critical thinking, writing, problem solving, project-based work) are just as applicable and useful in the workplace.

There are many forms of accelerated learning we offer at Northwood-Kensett. We offer students the opportunity to move up a grade for an individual subject, Advanced Placement (AP) courses, online learning, compacted curriculum, and concurrent enrollment courses.

Acceleration works and has long-term beneficial effects for students both academically and socially. Accelerated students are more challenged and therefore more engaged in school. They tend to be more ambitious, earning graduate degrees at higher rates. Looking back, an overwhelming majority of accelerated students say acceleration was the right decision for them.

Nurse's Corner by Kaitlyn Bruns, RN

Elementary Parents:

Spring is right around the corner but that doesn't mean we are out of the woods yet. I still see cooler weather in the forecast which means students will still need to wear their coats, hats, and gloves. I have multiple students a day still coming in and asking if they can borrow gloves, hats, coats, etc. Please remind your child to bring all of their warm clothing to school until warmer temps are here to stay!

Bicycle Safety Day: On April 22nd, our local Worth County Sheriff's Department will be coming to talk to students in grades K-6th about bicycle safety. On this day, your children are allowed to ride their bikes to school, as there will be obstacle courses, and bicycle safety checks for all of our students that want to bring their bikes that day!

Middle School and High Schoolers:

We will again be hosting a **Sports Physical Clinic** at the High School for all students <u>FREE</u> of charge. A sports physical is required for all athletic participants and is valid for 1 year and one month after the issue date. We will be holding the clinic on 2 different days to accommodate schedules.

Below is the assigned date and time for your child. We have split them up by grade level. Please review these and have your student come at the correct time and date assigned to them/their grade.

Current 6th, 7th, and 8th graders: Location: High School Gymnasium When: Wednesday April 13th at 3:30 pm.

Current 9th, 10th and 11th graders: Location: High School Gymnasium When: Wednesday April 6th at 3:00pm.

If this assigned day doesn't work please let Mr. Reindl or myself know and we will get them in on a different day. Coaches have agreed to be cooperative in letting their athletes participate.

Students will be seen on a 1st come 1st serve basis. Last time the wait in line averaged about 30 minutes if students didn't arrive right on time, please remind them to not get discouraged and to not leave if the line is long! It might help to let them know that this service is FREE and benefits both them and you ③ They don't have to go at an inopportune time and you save money; maybe the wait time could be spent doing homework!

A consent to treat form is required to be filled out in order for your student athlete to participate; this is found on the school's website under "Nurse", along with the physical form. We ask that you help your child fill out the health and family history section on the physical form. Copies of the treatment consent and blank physical forms can also be found in the High School office. Have your child bring the consent and physical forms with them on the day of their clinic. Please do not hesitate to contact Mr. Reindl or myself with any questions.
