- Dr. Wright came back, temp 102 (before breakfast)

- Mother wants Peg to get more nourishment
- Mother and Father leave and come back with a paper bag with a milkshake.
- Eight days after polio diagnosis, Peg's fever is still 102.
- Peg wants a milkshake but the nurse says no ice cream.
- 7-Up comes out of Peg's nose and she doesn't want to drink.
- Mom gave Peg a milkshake and she drank the whole thing without choking.
- First, Peg drinks ice water, apple juice, grape juice, and 7-Up but no milk.
- Peg's temperature drops.

- Peg continued the twice-daily hot packs and stretching and so did her progress.
- Peg lost herself in books for entertainment and read to Tommy.
- Peg scratched an itch on her leg with her left hand.
- Nurses and Dr. Bevis grab Peg to keep her from crashing to the ground.
- Peg could use both hands, then her arms, and finally she could move her legs.
- Peg tried to stand with help from Dr. Bevis and the nurses.
- Peg could use her arms to feed herself and turn the pages of a book.

- Most people think they have the flu until paralysis sets in.
- Bad haircuts, lost ball games, and petitions for girls to wear pants no longer mattered.
- Mail was delivered every afternoon.
- Peg received letters from her classmates.
- Quick action by Peg's parents created good luck.
- Peg received letters from Mother, Father, and BJ.
- Polio can be mild and go undiagnosed.

The Great Accordion Concert

- The accordion would help strengthen Peg's arm muscles and fingers.
- She couldn't move marbles but was going to learn to play accordion.
- Dad plays the accordion really bad but says he'll try again next week.
- Moved to Sheltering Arms Rehabilitation Hospital
- Dad rents and practices accordion.
- After practice, Dad plays the accordion flawlessly.

- Peg was weepy to leave behind the wheelchair.
- Peg graduates from Silver (wheelchair) to sticks (crutches).
- Peg takes Silver for a final ride with a high-speed race down the hallway.
- Peg pops a 2-wheel wheelie in Silver.

Back to School

- Peg walked into her first-period class to cheers.
- Peg and Dorothy write letters.
- Peg attended school in the mornings only until she could work up to a full day.
- Peg had not fallen behind and her singing voice improved because now she sang with her stomach muscles.
- Peg's friend, Dorothy, leaves Sheltering Arms with a wheelchair.
- Peg was nervous on the first day back.
- In April, Peg got permission to return to school.
