Students will:



Science Fiction

Myths, and Legends



This high-interest course will allow students to explore the relationship between popular culture, legends, science fiction, and mythology. Students will be offered the opportunity to deepen their understanding of a variety of writing and film genres. Many of us are already familiar with the characters and narratives of contemporary science fiction, making it easier for us to examine the presence of stereotypes and mythological elements in these popular stories. Students will read and view contemporary legends and science fiction stories that are based in classical myths.



Here's what we will do during the semester...

- Mythological roots of storytelling
- Excalibur / The Legend of King Arthur
- Speculative Fiction – 20th century origins
- Flash Gordon
- The Twilight Zone
- Star Trek
- Joseph Campbell's myth structure



MARVEL

We will spend a bit of time looking at Star Wars, including:

- Luke Skywalker as Campbell's myth hero
- The influence on modern sci-fi/hero movie
- The influence on modern cinematography / special effects
- Luke as hero vs. Rey as hero (Episode IV vs. Episode VII)
- The emergence of the female myth hero
 - Leia, Rey, Lara Croft, Wonder Woman, Katniss Everdeen
- Fan Fiction – writing to match Campbell's structure



- You will consider taking Science Fiction next year.
- Move along.
