THERE WILL BE NO EARLY DISMISSALS ALLOWED DURING EXAM WEEK

IN SHORT:

- 1. The second semester exam window is **June 2-9**. Make up exams will be given on **June 10**.
- 2. Exams must be given in all classes except for AP classes, where they are optional.
- 3. Students may <u>not</u> leave campus during or between exams.
- 4. Student dismissal from school each exam day will be no earlier than 12:45 PM.
- 5. Breakfast and lunch will be served each exam date.
- 6. Students may not visit other school campuses during the exam day.

Important Dates to Remember

- FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS Fines must be paid by 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 5th. Only cash payments will be accepted. Student fines are posted in the mall outside of the library.
- <u>Per CMS regulations, students who do not clear financial obligations MAY NOT</u> participate in the graduation ceremony.
- GRADUATION REHEARSAL Rehearsal will be held on Monday, June 2nd from 7:00 8:30 p.m. at Bojangles' Coliseum. Students are responsible for arranging their own transportation to and from rehearsal. Attendance at rehearsal is MANDATORY. Those students not in attendance may lose the privilege of participating in the ceremony.
 - Seniors should meet homeroom teachers in front of the arena by 6:45 PM.
 - Only graduating seniors are allowed into the arena for rehearsal.
- GRADUATION CEREMONY Commencement ceremonies will begin at 12:00 p.m. at Bojangles' Coliseum Thursday, June 12th. For the graduation ceremony, seniors must arrive by 11:00 a.m. to be in line with their homerooms. Seniors arriving late may lose the privilege of participating in the ceremony.

Graduation Information That Parents Need to Know:

In the interest of the safety of our graduates, staff and guests, CMS will utilize metal detectors for guests at all graduation ceremonies this year.

Bojangles' Coliseum will NOT allow air horns, back packs, balloons, banners, duffel bags, fanny packs, flowers, gifts, noisemakers, packages and outside food and beverages into the facility. Bags will be searched upon entry.

- HANDICAPPED ASSISTANCE There will be a designated drop-off area at the entrance for handicapped guests and other individuals who may need assistance. Guest services will assist with seating for guests. Seating is provided on a first come, first served basis. Because handicapped seating is limited, handicapped guests will be seated in the stands or on the floor, accompanied by only one member of the family.
- Tickets ARE NOT required for entry, and seating is unlimited. Doors will open at 11:00 for guests to enter. Graduation will end by 1:30.
- Seating is available on a first-come basis. All photos must be taken from the designated seating areas.
- After the ceremony, graduates will meet their guests outside the Coliseum.

What You Need to Know About Your Student and Graduation:

- ALL graduates must wear caps and gowns. Caps should be worn so that the board on top is flat, and tassels are placed on the right. Nothing should be worn on or outside of the cap and gown other than school-sanctioned and school-approved attire.
- Graduates should not bring ANY items that have to be carried, including bags, keys, cameras, sunglasses, or <u>cell phones</u>. These items may be confiscated until the end of the graduation ceremony. Programs will be distributed to graduates following the ceremony.
- MEN Shirt, tie, dress pants (no jeans), shoes and socks (no tennis shoes)
- WOMEN Dress or skirt & top (no hems below the gown), and dress shoes.
- Those students designated as "Honor Graduates" will be determined by GPA at the end of the year, and recognized during the graduation ceremony. According to CMS policy, the valedictorian and salutatorian will be determined based on a reconfiguration of grades following exams.
- CMS Graduation Requirements, as well as the qualifications for the designations of "North Carolina Scholar," "CMS Scholar," and "AP Scholar" can be found on the CMS website. Follow the link to "Board Policies," and search the Table of Contents for "Academic Achievement."

GradImages will take graduation portraits of those seniors receiving diplomas. Purchasing information will be mailed to students after the ceremony. If students did not provide addresses for the emailing of proofs, information will be mailed to the home address. REHEARSAL AND GRADUATION INFORMATION FOR SENIORS

Rehearsal – Arrive between 6:30 pm and6:45 pm at Bojangles' Coliseum on Monday, June 2rd
Graduation – Arrive by 11:00 am at Bojangles' Coliseum on Thursday, June 12th
Allow at least 25 minutes from SMHS to arrive at the arena – there will be HEAVY traffic!

To Do Before Rehearsal

- Order a cap, gown, or tassel from Herff-Jones (<u>www.hjgraduation.com</u>) or (704) 531-0015. If you owe a balance, and do not pick up your order on May 21st you must schedule with Herff-Jones to pick up your order they will not return to campus.
- Pay all financial obligations, and turn in all textbooks otherwise you will not receive a diploma. NO CHECKS will be accepted payments must be made with money orders or cash only. All fines must be paid by Thursday, June 5th by 2:30 pm. Per CMS regulations, students who do not clear financial obligations MAY NOT participate in the graduation ceremony.
- Attendance at rehearsal is MANDATORY. Those students not in attendance may lose the privilege of participating in the ceremony. All absences must be approved prior to rehearsal by Ms. Thompson in C12.
- Ms. Beltram and Coach Jones will be in the mall during all three lunches on Monday, May 19th and Tuesday, May 20st to verify name pronunciations.

Graduation Rehearsal

- Only graduating seniors may attend rehearsal. No outside guests are allowed in the arena. No food or drink will be allowed in the arena.
- You DO NOT need to bring or wear your cap and gown to rehearsal.
- You should arrive at Bojangles' Coliseum between 6:30 and 6:45 pm. When we enter the arena as a group, sit with your homeroom in the designated area look for a marshal holding a sign with your homeroom teacher's name on it. Your homeroom teacher or a marshal will distribute name cards and seating assignments. You must sit in alphabetical order.
- Your assigned seat at rehearsal may NOT be the same as your assigned seat at graduation. Do NOT destroy your seating card at rehearsal it will be used again at graduation.
- You can not change the name on your card, but can add pronunciation hints for the readers.
- We will run through the program, processional, and recessional at rehearsal.
- Rehearsal will end by 8:30 pm.

What to Wear To Graduation

- All graduates must wear a cap and gown. Tassels should be worn on the right.
- Nothing should be worn outside of or on top of the cap and gown other than school-sanctioned and school issued attire.
- MEN shirt, tie, dress pants (NO SHORTS OR JEANS), shoes and socks (NO TENNIS SHOES)
- WOMEN dress pants, dress, or skirt and top (no hems below the gown), dress shoes (NO FLOPS)
- Do not bring anything with you that you have to carry. Programs will be distributed with diplomas. Cameras, cell phones, and keys will be collected by the homeroom teacher and returned to students when diplomas are distributed by homeroom teachers after the ceremony.

The Graduation Ceremony

- All graduates must be in line with their homerooms in the lower level of the Coliseum by 11:00 am. Those students who arrive late run the risk of losing the privilege to walk.
- Before, during, and after the ceremony, the Junior Marshal will help you move in the right direction. You MUST listen to the directions of the marshals.
- All rules and expectations for behavior outlined in the Rights and Responsibilities Handbook will be enforced at graduation. Students may not possess or be under the influence of illegal substances. <u>Students choosing to disregard these regulations</u> will have their diploma held for pickup from Dr. Furr.
- The ceremony will end by 2:30 pm.

Graduation Information to Tell Your Parents

- A flier will be mailed home with information regarding the purchase of graduation videos. GradImages will mail or email proofs of photos taken at the graduation ceremony.
- The arena does not allow any outside items, gifts, balloons, food, signs, etc. into the facility. Bags will be searched, and guests will be wanded upon entry.
- No tickets are required, but seating is on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Parents and guests are not allowed on the floor of the Coliseum. There will not be a designated photography area - pictures must be taken from seats, or outdoors following the ceremony.
- Handicapped seating is available, but limited. Guests should arrive early. There will be a drop-off point in fornt of the Coliseum, and the Coliseum staff will assist in locating seating for handicapped individuals and <u>one</u> accompanying guest.
- Doors will open one hour prior to the beginning of the ceremony.

Please note: In a 2009 government web cast, Secretary of Education Arne Duncan described summer learning loss as "devastating." This is what researchers have often referred to as the "summer slide." It is estimated that school summer breaks will cause the average student to lose up to one month of instruction, with disadvantaged students being disproportionately affected. Additionally, students in the United States have lost ground in reading ability compared with students around the world. The global reading test was administered in 2001 and again in 2006. Americans dropped further behind other countries, falling from the fourth highest scores in the world in 2001 to tenth place in 2006. Please encourage your child to read 4-5 books this summer.




Sabres Baseball Team Presents A Check for Over \$20,000 to Miracle League
