Welcome to Social Problems! This is probably one of the most practical courses that you will take in the social studies field. This course deals with all of the problems taking place around us. We will examine the origins of these problems, the results of these problems, what is being done about these problems, and offer our opinions on how these problems should be dealt with.

Other than a research paper, this course will have some written work. However, you will be asked to do a good bit of reading (from the text, newspaper, and various assigned articles).

I also encourage a lot of classroom discussion on the topics we will be covering. In fact, we will have debates on many of the topics. Hopefully, you will find these subjects interesting, and together we can develop strategies to help society deal with its social problems.

Health care problems, AIDS

Unit Three - Alcohol and Other Drugs

A look at alcohol and drug abuse and the problems associated with them

Unit Four – Crime and Criminals

Types of criminals, causes of crime, and methods used to control crime

Unit Five – Violence

Explanations of violence, types of violence, and methods of prevention

Unit Six – Technology and Environment

How is technology bringing trouble to the environment?

Unit Seven – Poverty amid Affluence

Why is their poverty in one of the richest countries of the world?

Unit Eight – Prejudice and Discrimination

Origins of prejudice and discrimination and consequences of this problem

Unit Nine – Sex Roles and Inequality

Is sexism still a problem today? Also a look at sexual harassment

Unit Ten – An Aging Society

A look at the problems of our aging society, including retirement and death.

Unit Eleven – Problems of Public Education

A look at the issues facing public education

Unit Twelve – War and Terrorism

A look at the #1 foreign & domestic policy issue facing the U.S. –terrorism.

Grading

Your grade will be based on the following. Tests and your research paper will account for 50% of your grade. Reading quizzes and special projects will count as 30%. Any homework assignments will count as 20% of your grade. Your research paper will deal with or be associated with any of the above areas. You will also have a final, which will count as two test grades.
