Essential Knowledge	 The function of government is to protect the rights and responsibilities of its citizens and to defend itself. The rights of citizens in a democratic society include: freedom of speech, religion, and the press. The responsibilities of citizens in a democratic society include: active participation in government, holding public office and voting. The structure of state and federal government is prescribed in written Constitutions. They include the three main branches of government: Executive (enforces the laws), Legislative (makes the laws), and Judicial (interprets the laws). The government has a system of checks and balances. The Constitution protects the individual rights of citizens. The economic system of the United States provides the structure for employment for most Americans and agencies and charitable organizations help to support citizens who are unable to work.
