Essential Understandings	 The Persian Empire was the largest empire created in history until it was conquered by Alexander the Great. The Persians made several lasting cultural contributions and used creative political administrative methods.
Essential Questions	 What cultural and political ideas (created within Persia) had a lasting impact on neighboring and subsequent cultures? How were the Persians so successful at conquest and expansion, and then administering a vast multicultural empire?
Essential Knowledge	 Each Persian king made certain noteworthy achievements. The Indo-European migrations spawned several new cultures in the Middle East, and as the Persians developed, the balance of power in the region shifted among the neighboring peoples, resulting in a multicultural empire under Persian control. Certain background factors contributed to the eventual Persian Wars with the Greek city-states.
