Essential Understandings	 Laws and government have an effect on individuals and families throughout their lives. Although much of family life is private, it is also influenced by laws and government.
Essential Questions	 What is family law? What are laws that deal with marriage? What are the responsibilities between parents and children? How do foster care and adoption work? What laws are involved when parents go through separation, divorce or custody disputes?
Essential Knowledge	 The law is involved every time a birth, death, marriage or divorce take place. There are certain steps that people must follow to get legally married. Parents have a legal obligation to care for, support, and control their children—when parents are unable or unwilling to fulfill their responsibilities, the law becomes involved. Foster care and adoption are used to ensure that children have safe and healthy homes. Changes to a marriage, including separation and divorce, involve the law.
