SOCRATIC SEMINAR ACTIVITY SHEET

Topic: American Drug Policy

What is a Socratic seminar?

A Socratic seminar is a way of teaching founded by the Greek philosopher Socrates. Socrates believed that students learn best by asking questions. It is the teacher's job to moderate the discussion instead of leading the discussion.

Why do we have a Socratic seminar?

Socratic seminars help us engage a topic in class. The thought process of working together to understand a topic improves everyone's understanding.

What do we do to prepare for the seminar?

The day prior to the seminar you should complete Step 1 of this activity sheet. It is essential that you prepare complete responses to questions including quotations from the research and compose thought-provoking follow-up questions. Thoroughly understand the topic so that you are ready for any area of discussion.

What will this Socratic seminar look like?

Seven to eight students will be seated at the front of the classroom for approximately fifteen to twenty minutes (Step 2). This panel will participate in a discussion initially based on the teacher's question. Audience members must be respectful and active listeners (Step 3).

Panel:

- Actively participate without dominating.
- Cite text to support your points.
- Listen carefully and do not interrupt; look the speaker in the eye. Maintain good posture.
- Paraphrase another speaker's comment(s) before responding responsibly.
- Stick to the topic.
- Ask pertinent questions and ask for clarification if you are confused.
- Discuss ideas; do not attack people.

Audience:

- Be respectful of your classmates and listen.
- Take notes.
