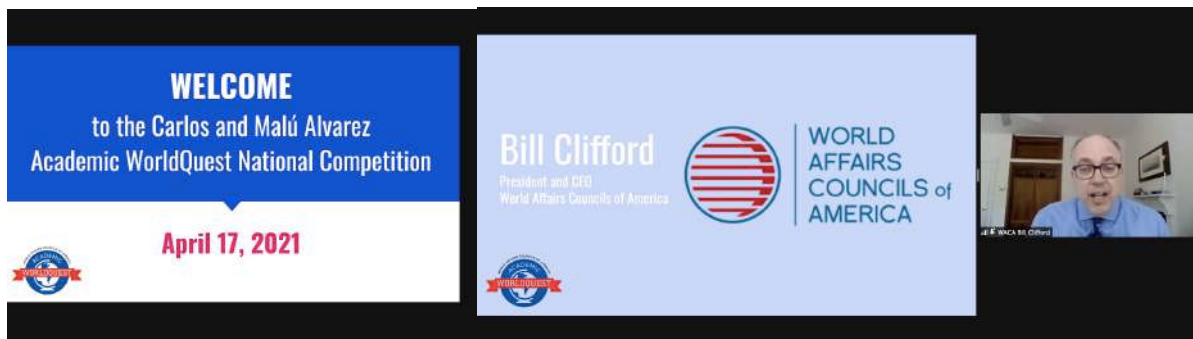

## Academic Worldquest Teams Compete at the National Level!

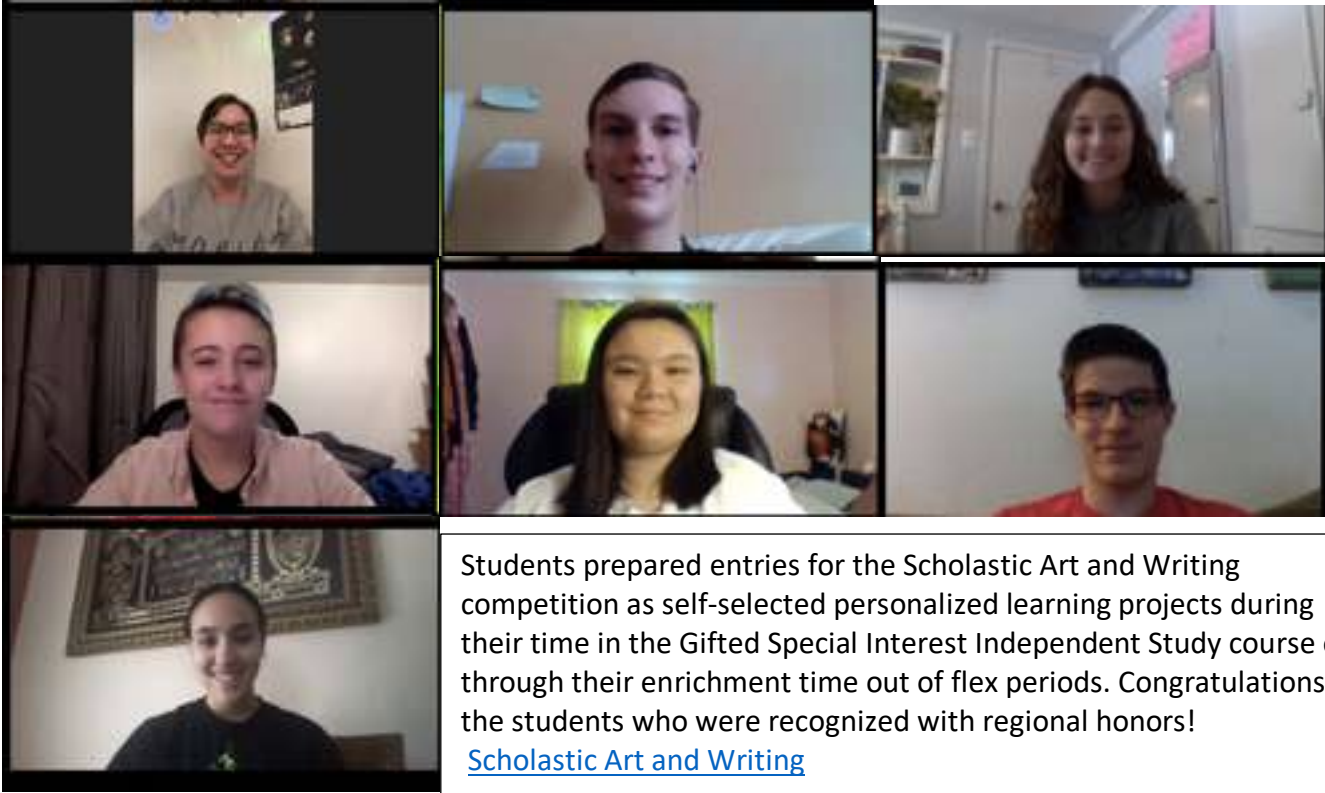
Congratulations to the Cedar Cliff Special Interest Academic Worldquest teams! On March 20, our teams won first and second places in the Harrisburg competition, which advanced the teams to compete at the national level on April 17, 2021! Typically, we would have traveled to Washington D.C. for the national competition, but this year it was held on Zoom. More than 400 students on 105 teams competed from across the country. Cedar Cliff students prepared for the competition in Gifted Independent Study or through flex enrichment by reading about world affairs in ten different competition categories: Global Protests; Shifting Sands, the Arab Spring 10 Years On; International Labour Organization; The U.S. Foreign Service Office in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century; Country in Focus: Uzbekistan; Exploring Peace in a World of Conflict; Fraying Alliances, Looking to a Post-Pandemic Economy; Great Decisions; and Current Events.

### Congratulations to Cedar Cliff junior Soloman Khan-Syed!

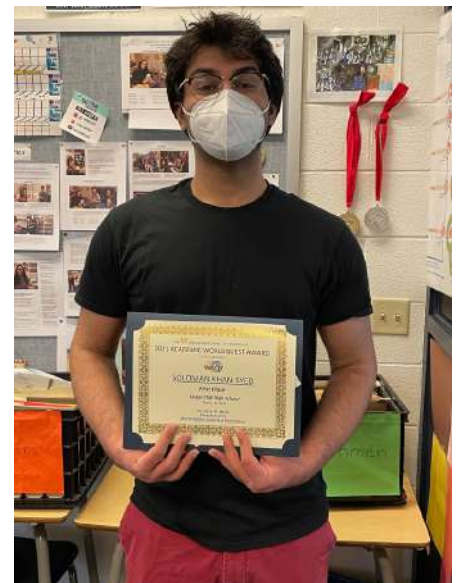
Soloman won first place and \$300.00 in the regional New Cumberland VFW Post Voice of Democracy audio essay competition. Soloman prepared his essay as a self-selected personalized learning Special Interest enrichment project.

Soloman's audio essay answered the theme, *Is This the Country the Founders Envisioned?* Soloman's winning audio essay then advanced to the District 18 level, which judged student winners from Cumberland, Dauphin, and Lebanon Counties.

Soloman's essay won second place at this advanced District 18 level, and he was awarded an additional \$400.00! Well done Soloman in addressing the theme and winning second place at the district level!

The national winner of this competition is awarded a \$30,000 scholarship. The competition is open to 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade students each year.

Zyler recently finished in third place out of 68 teams competing in the 10-week Regional Spring PA Stock Market Game Simulation (Feb. 8-April 16), sponsored by the Foundation of Free Enterprise! The Foundation recognized Zyler during a recent Zoom Awards Ceremony on May 18.

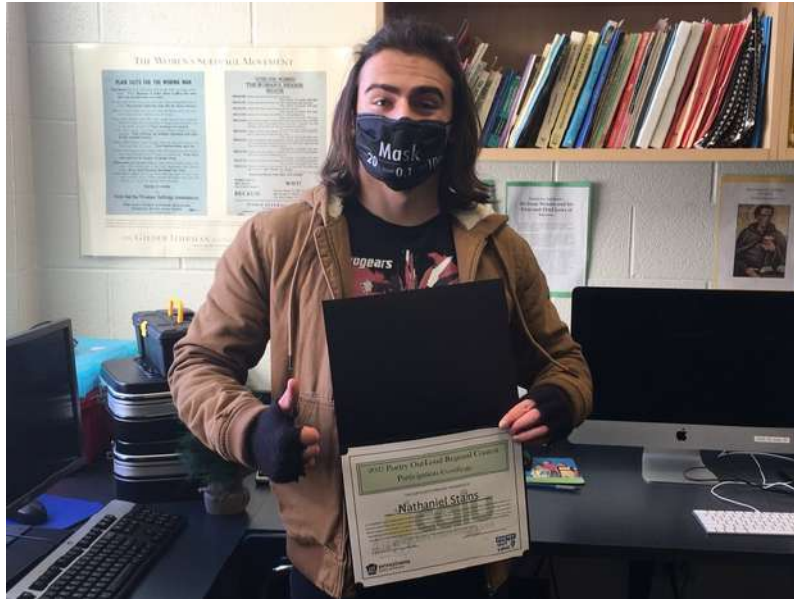
Zyler invested "\$100,000.00" in the stock market and ended the 10-week competition with an equity of "\$109,711.94."

Zyler outperformed neighboring teams from Manheim, Trinity, Ephrata, Hershey, and Red Land. Zyler's top earning stock was short selling 95 shares of Game Stop to make over \$10,000.00 and a 40% return. Great job Zyler!



Zyler chose to prepare and participate in this competition as a Special Interest flex enrichment project. Other Cedar Cliff gifted students who chose this as a personalized flex enrichment activity included the teams of Evan Heisler and Grayson Wertz (ranked 6/68), Ian McCurdy (ranked 7/68), Maddie Graf and Mikayla Gay (ranked 13/68), Cade Griva and Eliot Horn, Karina Chima, and Michael Flamini. During their gifted enrichment time, students learned about the basics of researching companies and making investment decisions of buying, selling, short selling, and short covering. ## Poetry Out Loud!



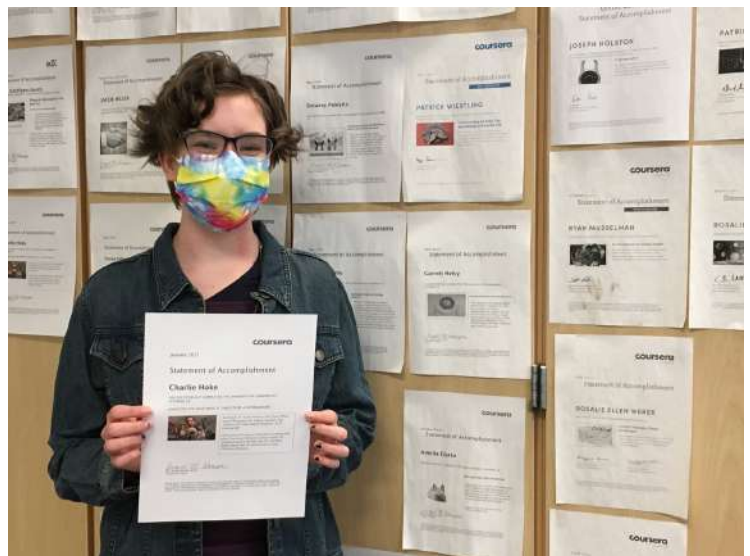

## Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) and Independent Study

Students may take the Special Interest Independent Study course for a grade and .5 credit by scheduling the [S.I. Independent Study Course 888604](#). This year five independent study courses were held fall semester and four occurred in the spring semester. In addition to self-selecting individualized areas of study based on strengths and interests, students complete two Socratic Seminar Philosophical Units each semester. Students analyzed and discussed primary text documents written by Plato, Aristotle, Ayn Rand, and Immanuel Kant. Some individual projects included studying Arabic, Japanese, creative writing, and computer programming. 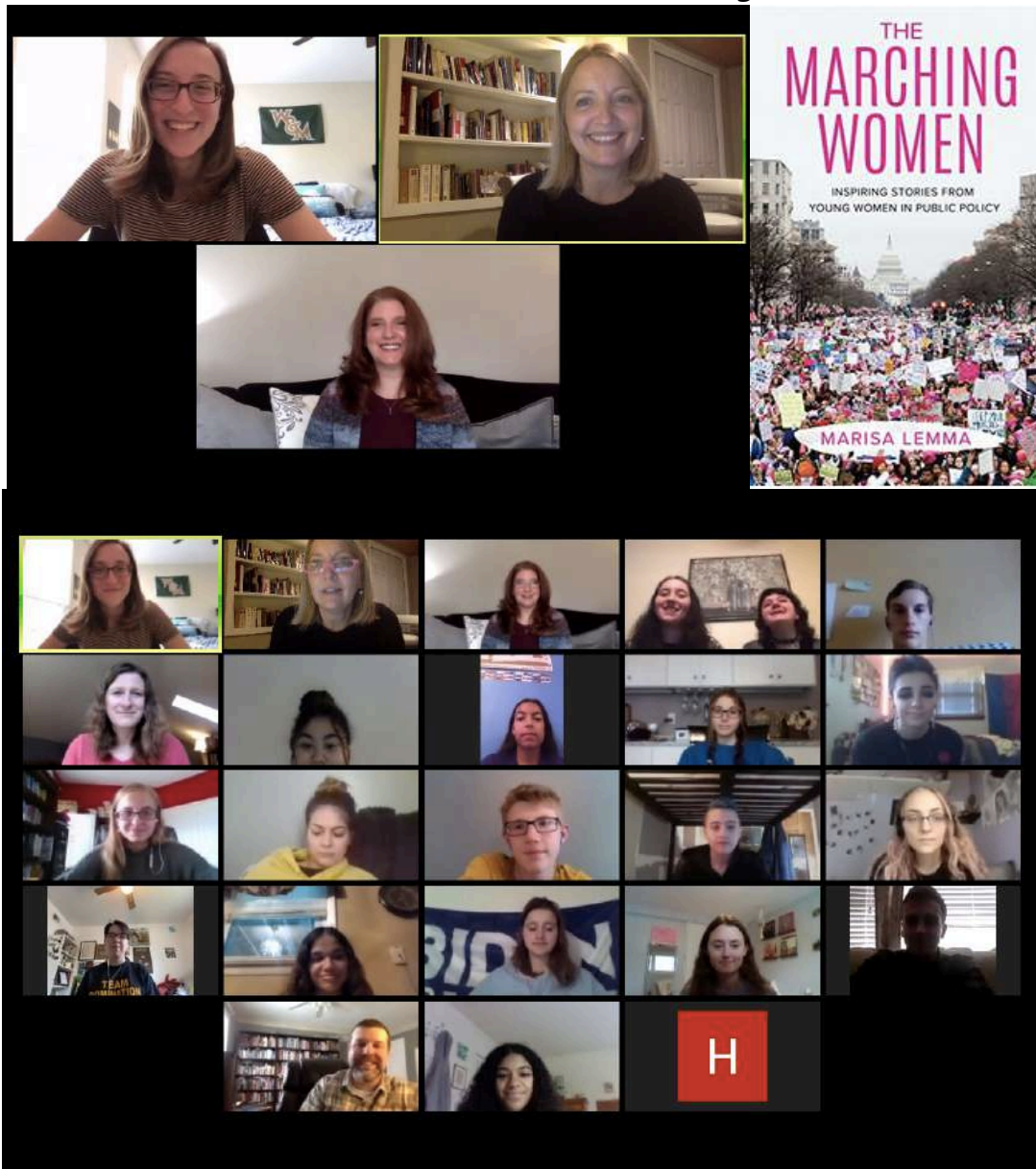
# Red Land and Cedar Cliff Gifted Programs

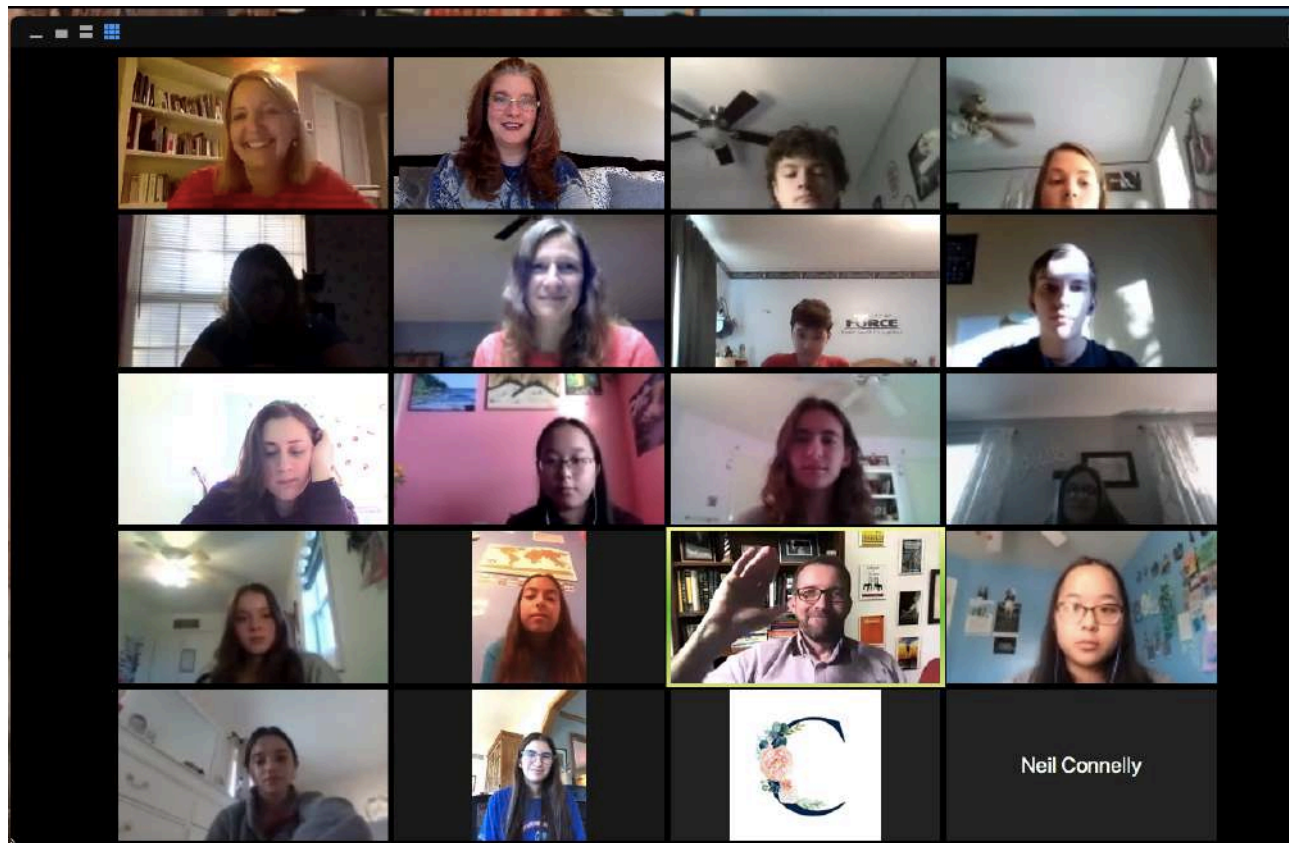
