MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

PLANNING FOR OUR FUTURE



We hope that you'll enjoy this special year-end review edition of the Spring 2019 Jordan Journalist, complete with highlights from the 2018-2019 school year, updates on programming, a snapshot of our winter parent survey results, and a look ahead to next fall when the district plans to run an operating and bond referendum aimed at continuing our forward progress.

Excellent staff, quality instruction, strong student achievement, and innovative programming are what make our district desirable for families. We are focused on responsible, continuous growth of our district, and of the quality services we provide our students and families. In order to remain a "destination district," and one that is competitive with our fast growing progressive neighbors, we must continue to think proactively about how we educate our students. Our goal is to support students. They need to be happy, well adjusted, productive members of our community, and prepared for whatever postsecondary opportunities await them. In addition, our community is built on the backbone of our schools. **All ages look to the schools for a place to learn, enjoy the arts, take in an athletic contest, have a conversation, or exercise and recreate.** We are proud to serve the Jordan community and all resident age groups.

This referendum proposal, with its operating levy question and two bond referendum questions comes after a long range facilities and operations planning process which began in November of 2017 and **culminated in the sharing of the 20-30 year vision in March of 2019**. This nearly 16 month process involved parents, community members, school board members, teachers, our architectural firm, the District's financial advisors, and District administrators. This team developed a responsible plan to address our needs, driven by growth and an ever-changing society, in order to meet the expectations of our students, families, and the residents of our district for years to come. **The committee developed ideas that led to the creation of a 4 phase plan that outlines the projects and progress that will take place over the next 3 decades**, dependent on growth of our student and community population, and their future needs.

Separate from this planning process, the District has worked with the City of Jordan in partnership to discuss current and future challenges and needs through a series of committee meetings with the City and School Partnership Committee. We've met with various real estate developers to obtain an understanding of potential future growth, and we've commissioned the assistance of a proven demographer to help us understand and predict growth trends.

WHY NOW?

We've listened to the needs of our families and there is an expectation of greatness. The positive impact of the 2014-2015 middle school and the building of the Jordan Community Education and Recreation Center (CERC) has changed the way we educate students across the district and the positive connections forged amongst community members. We have been inspired! We're focused on a proactive approach when educating students and providing our community with opportunities to learn and grow. A recent demographic study points towards continued growth which we must account for in a responsible manner. **The long range vision reflects the need for continued, responsible growth of future ready programming, and facilities for our students and District residents.**

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

Jordan is awarded the "MN School Finance Award" for 5th year! This is awarded annually by the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE), Division of School Finance, to recognize schools for meeting statutory deadlines for submission of audited fiscal financial data and reporting criteria. Criteria includes:

- √ Timely Submission of Financial Data and Compliance with Minnesota Statutes
- **√** Presence of Select Indicators of Fiscal Health
- √ Accuracy in Financial Reporting

Additionally, we take pride in our financial leadership! Amy Hafemann, Finance Director for Jordan Public Schools has completed the Minnesota Association of School Business Officials (MASBO), Leadership Academy, a 13 month course. Also, Amy was recently elected to Region V Computer Service Board of Governance. This is the kind of knowledge and oversight our community can be proud of!

PHASE ONE

QUESTION

The work of our Long Range Planning Committee and the City and School Partnership Committee has led to a recommendation to the school board that next fall is the right time to ask voters to consider passing phase one of the long range plan. On Tuesday, November 5, 2019, Jordan Public Schools district residents will vote on three questions:

An operating levy of \$300 per pupil unit

An operating levy helps support student programs and services. Currently, we DO NOT have a voter approved operating levy in place. These additional operating dollars are needed to:

- continue to maintain low elementary class sizes
- improve STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and
- attract and retain high quality teachers and staff
- provide operating dollars for our campus to include the new proposed facilities found in Question 2 and 3

CAMPUS

North Campus congestion relief and District programming extensions will be found on the new South Campus of Jordan **Public Schools.** In July of 2016, the District purchased 40 acres of farmland at 940 Broadway Street South here in Jordan to be used for future development by the District. The purchase of this property was for a price of \$1,025,000. The District utilized taxable certificates of participation to make this purchase, using capital dollars to make debt payments. There was no taxpayer impact associated with this transaction. The land sits just south of Jordan between Hwy 21 and the west side of the Bridle Creek development along Hope Avenue. Most of the property is farmland (approximately 33 acres), but the property also includes a small piece of wooded land and a house built in 1999. The District has been renting the house out and has a lessee who currently farms the ag land. This rental income has helped pay back the certificates of participation (loan) that was used to purchase the property. As part of the long range facilities plan, the South Campus will be home to the future Jordan Early Learning Services programming and a future new elementary school. In addition, new ball fields, trails, playground, and indoor recreation

facilities are planned for the south campus property.

Our continued growth, evolving needs, and future steps have been examined closely by our Long Range Planning Committee. We are excited to share these drawings based on educational and community priorities and desires.


20-30 YEAR PLAN FOR NORTH CAMPUS
