This standards and indicators manual represents the collaborative efforts of many dedicated individuals from across the state who have responsibilities for working with students with disabilities. As a result of these efforts and their willing cooperation, this manual provides a resource for special educators in their work of providing quality special education services to children with disabilities throughout the State of Missouri.

Section I. State Performance Plan Monitoring Priorities, Indicators, and Targets

State Performance Plan Indicators

Federal Regulations provide guidance to SEAs that require monitoring of LEA's to be completed so that improved educational results and functional outcomes for students with disabilities occur. Focus upon the State Performance Plan (SPP) and performance targets established within that plan is central to the monitoring process. Compliance indicators are related to SPP indicators.

Indicator 1 – Graduation: Percent of youth with IEPs graduating with regular diploma.

Indicator 2 – Dropout: Percent of youth with IEPs dropping out.

Indicator 3 - Assessment:

- A. Participation rate for children with IEPs;
- B. Proficiency rate for children with IEPs against grade-level academic standards;
- C. Proficiency rate for children with IEPs against alternate academic achievement standards; and
- D. Gap in proficiency rates for children with IEPs and all students against grade-level academic standards.

Indicator 4 - Suspension and Expulsion:

- A. Percent of LEAs with significant discrepancy; and
- B. Percent of LEAs with significant discrepancy by race/ethnicity.

Indicator 5 - Educational Environments: Percent of children with IEPs, age five and enrolled in kindergarten and ages six through 21 served,

- A. Inside regular class 80% or more of the day;
- B. Inside regular class less than 40% of the day;
- C. In separate schools, residential facilities, or homebound/hospital placements.

Indictor 6 - Preschool Environments: Percent of children ages three, four and five who are enrolled in a preschool program,

- A. Receiving majority of special education and related services in regular early childhood program;
- B. Attending separate special education class, separate school, or residential facility;
- C. Receiving special education and related services in the home.

Indicator 7 - Preschool Outcomes: Percent of preschool children ages 3 – 5 with IEPs with improved,
