## Safety

During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will


## Safety: Personal Communication Device Survey





#### **Facilities**

During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will

- partner with Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) through Expedited Local Partnership Program (ELPP) to update the Facilities Master Plan and enrollment projections to further develop options for the Tiger Legacy Project.
- continue to update the Facilities Master Plan to ensure proper and strategic annual expenditures so that all projects align with the plan and that expenses can be supported through the Permanent Improvement fund.
- continue community engagement regarding the Tiger Legacy Project in efforts to further refine the plan.

#### **Facilities**

- OFCC has completed the building and property assessments
  - Focused analysis of all buildings, operating systems and property
- OFCC has finalized our master plan report
  - Based on our enrollment projections and assessment data, this serves as a guide for decision making regarding future investments and maintenance of our facilities
- Board of Education work session scheduled with OFCC on April 16th @ 6pm to analyze data and discuss next steps
  - Future plans and next steps will be discussed and shared later this Spring

#### Finance



During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will develop a financial plan which includes implementation of the FY23 Expenditure Reduction Plan to maintain fiscal stability through FY24:

In order to see how expected costs in the categories of Salaries, Benefits, Purchased Services & Supplies/Equipment are after the Expenditure Reduction Plan Implementation compared to a year ago, Treasurer completed an Expense Comparison Analysis of the same period last fiscal year (September 1, 2022 - January 31, 2023) to this fiscal year (September 1, 2023 - January 31, 2024).

#### Quick summary:

- Salaries were about \$200K higher this year. Note: we did have a 2% pay increase & step increases.
- In the Benefits section you will see the largest savings reflected:
  - ➤ Insurance Benefits at about \$935K; reason is the *December 2023*Premium Holiday with the COG opposed to June/July in the prior year.
- About \$122K savings in Supplies, due to the Centralized Purchasing implemented in August 2023.

During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will implement and evaluate new online tools used to increase efficiencies in the Treasurer's Office and Twinsburg City School District operations.

- Electronically submitted District issued W2 and 1099 reporting to the IRS
- We started looking at options for District Inventory Management tools

 further research funding options for the Tiger Legacy Project and present to the Board of Education for their consideration.

Special Board meeting to be scheduled for OFCC assessment data presentation. Financing options will be discussed and determined by the Board once the District receives facilities assessment data from the OFCC.


During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will


- ensure educational equity and excellence for each and every student by providing staff members with access to support, tools, and systems to improve student achievement.





# Beech Brook Services At Twinsburg CSD: What we do

Now in our ninth year of partnership, The Twinsburg City School District has contracted with Beech Brook, a children, youth and families mental health agency that has been in business for 170 years, to provide social work and counseling services. These services are provided to meet the social-emotional needs of students as well as support the needs of the district as a whole./

#### Beech Brook Services: What we do

The school-based Mental Health Program at Twinsburg is:

- > Free and available to any student in the district that is in need.
- Referrals to our services are coordinated by Twinsburg building administrative and counseling teams.
- Services are provided on a scheduled and/or an as-needed basis by Master's level and licensed clinicians.
- Beech Brook staff provides 1:1 informal counseling support in the form of regular check-ins to process, educate, and build skills based on individualized need(s).
- Special programming may include prevention programming, PBIS team involvement, and other wellness initiatives.

The school-based program at Twinsburg is not:

Formal mental health/therapy services.

#### Beech Brook Services: The Referral Process

Student demonstrates mental health or high risk concern. -Teacher/Staff completes referral and submits to School Counselor and building admin. -School Counselor or Admin assesses whether student is appropriate

for SW

services

If Social Work Services are NOT deemed necessary, School Counselor will follow up with student, provide ongoing assessment of needs and consult with teachers, parents and building admin.

Services ARE deemed appropriate and necessary for student: -School Counselor or Building admin. makes initial contact with parent to present service. -SW initiates follow-up call to parent, explores student needs in more depth, and provides

consent to

initiate services.


If Social Work

Social Worker will see student individually and/or in small groups once per week or as needed, based on student need. Social Worker will continue to provide ongoing consultation with School Counselor, Building Admin, and teachers to enhance continuity and student success

- Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among people aged 10-14 and the 3rd leading cause of death among those aged 15-24 in the U.S- National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH)
