# **Course Description:**

Advanced Placement English Literature and Composition is an intensive course which emulates college coursework in the field of English. As a community, we will deepen and broaden our awareness of how writers create an experience, communicate meaning for readers, and explore the human experience through imaginative literature.

# Reading:

This course will demand that you read more material and read it more carefully than any class you've taken. I EXPECT YOU TO COMPLETE ALL READING ASSIGNMENTS BEFORE CLASS AND COME PREPARED TO DISCUSS THEM. Reading quizzes will be difficult and unannounced.

### Writing Notebook:

This will be your space to record and reflect on the content of the course [themes, readings, discussions, and assignments]. The notebook will be an exploratory space where you can RESPOND to the literature we read. Notes from lectures, readings, discussions, in-class activities, and research

✓ Writing assignments (freewrites, journals, dialogue, question-posing, etc.) completed in class

### AP Exam:

The AP examination consists of 55 multiple choice questions, covering three literary genres (poetry, fiction, and drama) and 3 essay questions—a poem analysis, a prose analysis, and an "open" or free response question. We will prepare for both sections of the exam throughout each semester.
