Lesson 1 - One Country, Five Regions

- 1. A <u>region</u> is an area with common features that set is apart from other areas.
- 2. New Jersey is a part of the **Northeast region**.

- 4. Most states in the Northeast have the Appalachian Mountains.
- 5. Wetlands, such as bayous, swamps, and marshes are located in the Southeast.
- 6. Corn and wheat are the main crops in the Middle West.
