Summer projects to limit school access

Normandale Hills Elementary School will undergo a comprehensive school maintenance and renovation project at the close of this school year with an expected completion date of late December. The property will be cordoned off prohibiting the use of the playground and parking lot areas.

This NH project will require installation of a portable structure to house preschool classrooms. The portable classrooms will be attached to the building and include all of the existing school safety elements, including secured accesses and alarms.

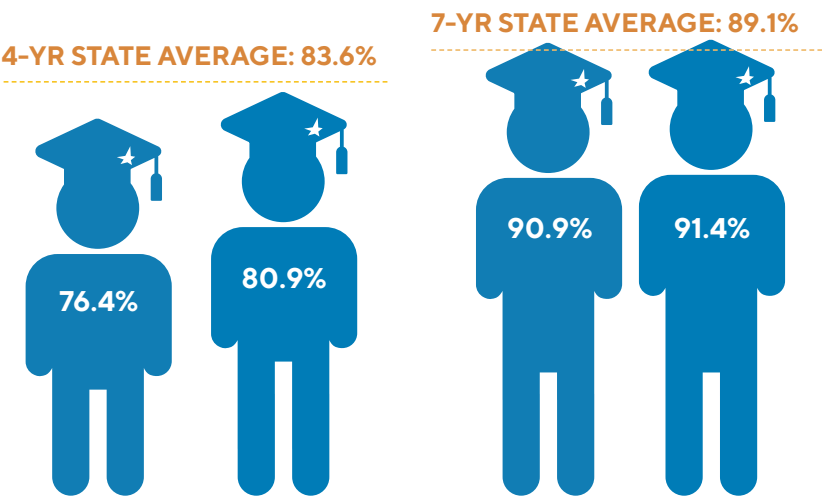
Renovations and improvements are focused on mechanical and improved energy management systems and facility upgrades, including the addition of a new flex-space learning area.

Other summer projects across the district that may result in school and campus closures including:

- Roofing projects to prepare for solar panels at Poplar Bridge, and Oak Grove elementary and middle schools.
- Resurfacing of the Hillcrest playlot (closed for the summer)
- Driveway safety improvements at Olson elementary and middle schools. This project is under the direction of the City of Bloomington.
- Kennedy High School classroom renovations, including science lab and art room, and the replacement of trusses in the auditorium.

These projects are annually funded by the school board approved Alternative Facilities Levy.

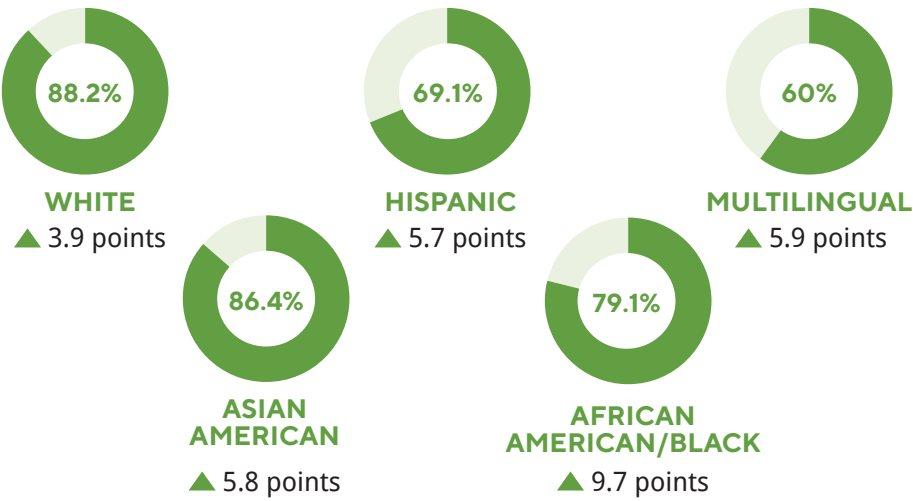
Graduation Rates See Big Gains



Bloomington Public Schools’ four-year graduation rate increased from 76.4 percent to 80.9 percent between 2021-2022. The state’s four-year graduation rate rose slightly to 83.6 percent, a 0.2 percent increase. The district’s seven-year graduation rate increased from 90.9 percent to 91.4 percent, higher than the statewide rate of 89.1 percent.

“Despite the multitude of challenges brought on by the pandemic we have continued to outperform state graduation averages with a combined focus on essential learning, positive relationship building, and a focus on the holistic wellbeing of each student,” said Jaysen Anderson, principal of Jefferson High School.

Four-year graduation rates for most student groups increased, including:



Rates for students who receive free- or reduced-price lunch and students who receive special education services also increased.

“Coming out of the pandemic, nothing has been more important than rebuilding each student’s sense of belonging to our school community. With relationships at the center, staff and teachers are working in partnership with students to create learning environments that honor students’ humanity and hold them to high academic expectations. It’s inspiring to see their excellence shine,” said Molly Hollenbeck, principal of Kennedy High School.

BPS also monitors its seven-year graduation rate in alignment with a strategy to ensure all students graduate career and college ready. Students can defer their diploma and continue in transition, special education and credit recovery programs up to age 21 while completing personal growth/ post-graduation plans and goals.

Seven-year graduation rates for African American/Black, Asian, and students who identify with two or more races increased by 7.9, 8.9, and 23 points, respectively. The seven-year graduation rates for African American/Black and Asian students are the highest in six years, with 100 percent of Asian American students graduating high school within seven years.

**Note: seven-year graduation rate data in this report will differ slightly from the MDE Report Card due to a change in ethnicity codes used by MDE for students who identify as American Indian, two or more races, or Hispanic or Latino. Bloomington Public Schools will continue using current reporting codes at this time in order to maintain a consistent year-over-year comparison of graduation data.*

13th District-wide Food Drive Nets 63,500 pounds

Thank you to students, families, business and civic partners and the community for your donations to our annual Food Drive. We collected over 11,300 pounds of non-perishable food and \$14,495 in monetary donations during the week-long District-wide Food Drive in April.

The collection totaled 63,523 pounds with the cash donations-to-pounds conversion, providing nearly 53,000 meals. Each dollar donated accounts for three meals, and each meal is approximately 1.2 pounds.

All of the food and cash is donated to Volunteers Enlisted to Assist People (VEAP), a non-profit agency serving low-income families and individuals in Bloomington, Edina, and Richfield. VEAP serves 10,000 people a month, more than half of whom are children.

The Parent Teacher Student Advisory (PTSA) Council coordinated the annual food drive, and had set a goal of 50,000 pounds. This year’s total is 14,350 pounds more than what was collected in 2022. More than 652,000 pounds have been collected since the food drive’s inception in 2009.
