



Summer Articulation and Language Games

(The following games can be used with the articulation and vocabulary word list or the literature language questions.)

Ice Cream Sundae Game

Photocopy the following ice cream sundae pattern (page 72). Color the parts, cut them apart and laminate them. (Hint: Color each scoop of ice cream a different color to represent different ice cream flavors.) Make a sample ice cream sundae so that the students can see what parts they need to make the ice cream sundae. Give each child a bowl piece and put the remaining pieces into a bag. After a student makes a sentence with a summer word containing his/her sound or answers a summer language question, the student may reach into the bag and pull out one sundae piece. (If the child does not have the piece drawn, he/she may keep it for the sundae. If the child does have the piece drawn, he/she must put it back and wait for the next turn.) Whoever completes the ice cream sundae first is the winner.

Team Approach

In order to win the game, each team member must complete an entire ice cream sundae by the end of class.

Popsicle Matching Game

Photocopy the popsicle pattern (page 73). Color two popsicles for each color. Glue popsicles to construction paper, cut out and laminate. Lay all the cards face down on the table in a pile. After a student makes a sentence with a summer word containing his/her sound or answers a summer language question, the student may choose one popsicle card. The object of the game is to see how many matching colored popsicles each student can collect by the end of class.

Language Extension

Talk about how popsicles feel and taste. Brainstorm lists of other items that feel cold or taste sweet. Talk about what happens when a popsicle gets warm. What are some other things that melt when they get warm?

Picnic Game

Make a copy of the picnic pattern (page 74) for each student. Color the pieces, cut them apart and laminate them. Put a blanket on the floor, give each child a paper plate (or picture of a plate) and tell them that you are going on a pretend picnic. Each student must get a sandwich, an apple, potato chips, a drink, and a cookie from the basket (or bag) to put on the plate by the end of class. After a student makes a sentence with a summer word containing his/her sound or answers a summer language question, the student may reach into the bag and pull out one piece. (If the child does not have the piece drawn, he/she may keep it for his/her plate. If the child does have the piece drawn, he/she must put it back and wait for the next turn.) Whoever completes the picnic plate first is the winner.

Team Approach

In order to win the game, each team member must fill an entire plate by the end of the class.

Barrier Game

Color and laminate Barrier Game scenes (pages 75 and 76). Copy, color, cut out and laminate barrier game objects (page 77). Separate the students using a tall box or therapy mirror. Give one team a completed scene. Give the other team the empty scene and objects (page 75). The team with the completed scene must describe to the other team where each object should be placed. The team placing objects is allowed to ask three questions to ensure proper placement. The object is for the team with the empty scene and objects to re-create the completed scene of the other team. The game is ideal for students working on language and listening skills or for those students who are at the sentence-through-conversation level of articulation therapy.


Going Camping Game

Make one copy of the trail game board for each student (page 78). Color and laminate each game board. Photocopy on light-colored construction paper, cut out and laminate the direction cards (page 79). The object of the game is to get the campers to their campsite. After a student makes a sentence with a summer word containing his/her sound or answers a summer language question, the student may choose a direction card. The direction card will tell the student to move forward a select amount of steps on the trail or to remain in place. The student who gets to the campsite first is the winner of the game.

Language Extension


After completing the game, ask the students to brainstorm the things they might see on a trail through the forest. Then, discuss what you might take on a camping trip and why you might take the items.




Popsicle Game
