## **Donovan Elementary School (Donovan School)**

Wednesday, March 30th was a great day for the Donovan School and one of its teachers, Taylor Thai who received a prestigious Milken Award. The event was shared in a Press Release by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education that reads as follows.

# Randolph Educator Receives National Milken Award

RANDOLPH - A Randolph elementary school teacher today was surprised with a prestigious Milken Educator Award.

Taylor Thai, a kindergarten and first-grade teacher of multilingual students at Donovan Elementary, became the state's 47th Milken Award winner. She is the only Massachusetts recipient in 2021-2022 and is one of more than 60 recipients across the country this school year. The Milken Award recognizes exemplary elementary and secondary teachers, principals and specialists who are furthering excellence in education and comes with an award of \$25,000.

"We are grateful to teachers like Mrs. Thai who have worked hard to support students, especially given the challenges of the past two years," said Governor Charlie Baker. "The Pandemic created learning challenges for all students,



especially English language learners, and dedicated teachers like Mrs. Thai make a huge difference as we address those challenges and work together to ensure kids get the education they deserve."

"Teachers like Mrs. Thai who serve multilingual students have worked harder than ever during the pandemic, first through remote teaching and learning, and then by reconnecting with their students and families in person," Lt. Governor Karyn Polito said. "We are lucky to have dedicated professionals like her in our schools, and we wish her and her students all the best."

Mrs. Thai teaches English to multilingual students and collaborates with teachers to make lessons in other subjects accessible to all students whose first language is not English. She works hard on family engagement, and her fluency in Vietnamese has made her a strong resource for the school's Vietnamese community. During remote learning, she assembled and delivered packets for each of her students, adopted new technology quickly, and helped her colleagues learn new tools. Beyond the classroom, Mrs. Thai has previously served as an INSPIRED Fellow and a member of DESE's Teacher Advisory Cabinet.

"Mrs. Thai's ability to support her colleagues, connect with families, and put her students at the center of all her efforts is a reminder of all that Massachusetts teachers do," Education Secretary James Peyser said. "It's a pleasure to see her work recognized in this way."

During an assembly at the school today, Mrs. Thai was presented with her award by Dr. Jane Foley, senior vice president of the Milken Educator Awards and a Milken recipient herself, and Regina Robinson, deputy commissioner of the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

"So many educators like Mrs. Thai work hard day in and day out without a lot of fanfare, so it's great to see her recognized in this way," said Elementary and Secondary Education Commissioner Jeffrey C. Riley.



"The award is a good reminder of how critical the teaching profession is, and I hope today's surprise announcement will encourage some of her students to consider teaching as a career."

"It's a pleasure to recognize Mrs. Thai in front of her students," said Deputy Commissioner Robinson. I'm grateful for the work she does here in Randolph and for her work with DESE on teacher recruitment and retention and education policy."

Mrs. Thai, a Braintree resident, received a bachelor's degree in legal studies from the University of Massachusetts Amherst in 2006 and a master's degree in elementary education from Lesley University in 2011. She has worked at Donovan Elementary since 2013 and has been a teacher for 12 years.

"Educators like Taylor Thai set the bar high for solutions to help all students succeed," Dr. Foley said. "Her compassion and persistence to meet student needs are inspiring and have positively impacted English language learners across the school. What's more, Taylor understands the essential role that families play, becoming a trusted source for parents and strengthening the school community. I congratulate Taylor and welcome her into the Milken Educator Network."

The Milken Family Foundation first presented the Milken Educator Awards in 1987. Massachusetts joined the program in 1997. Since then, \$1,175 million has been awarded to recipients in Massachusetts. Recipients can use their \$25,000 award in any way they choose.

# Randolph High School (RHS)

The John and Abigail Adams Scholarship is a merit-based program that provides a credit toward tuition for up to eight semesters of undergraduate education at a Massachusetts state college or university. For this scholarship, merit is based on student scores on the 10th grade Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) test. The purpose of the award is to:

- Reward and inspire student achievement;
- Help attract more high-performing students to Massachusetts public higher education; and
- Provide families of college-bound students with financial assistance.



In order to receive this award, students need to meet three criteria: l) score in the Advanced category on one of three high school state assessment tests in English Language Arts, Mathematics, or STE (Biology, Chemistry, Introductory Physics or Technology/Engineering); 2) score in the Proficient or Advanced category on the remaining two high school state assessment tests; 3) and have a combined MCAS score on these assessments that ranks in the top 25% in their our school district.

The following Randolph High School (RHS) students received this prestigious award and we will recognize them publicly during our Scholarship Awards Night on Wednesday, May 11th.

## Math Update

Randolph Public Schools (RPS) received DESE's Financial Literacy Planning and Implementation Grant. RPS is creating a team of staff members to deepen the understanding of the financial literacy standards and develop and supplement our current High School financial literacy program.

RPS strives to provide learning opportunities to all students that can provide real life experiences to help them become contributing members of our community. The financial literacy curriculum will provide some of these experiences including income, home buying, credit, investments, taxes, etc.

Randolph High School (RHS) math teachers received training and practice on utilizing the Math Work Rooms, including workstations, graphing, collaboration, critical thinking application problems, etc.



Ms. Winans Algebra I class in the "Graphing Room" A student walks the slope from a point while their group verbally directs them where to walk in order to graph a linear equation on the floor coordinate plane. Ms. Winans and Mr. Tavares used these rooms to reinforce what the students were learning about linear equations and writing equations in slope-intercept form, point-slope form, and standard form in the "Station Room."





Mrs. MacElveen utilized the "Station Room" as a review day of quadratic equations. The students worked at 10 stations solving various types of quadratic equation problems and applications. The students solved problems by using the quadratic formula, completing the square, factoring, and application problems.

# Science/Engineering/Computer Science Update

Elementary science/computer science are planning an expansion to our program offerings for next year. The addition of 3 new kindergarten modules, I first grade module, 2 second grade modules, and I fifth grade module in conjunction with restructuring of our existing modules will ensure that all elementary students experience a robust and comprehensive curriculum at all elementary grade levels.

Randolph Community Middle School (RCMS) science classes are currently working through their second OpenSciEd (OSE) unit of SY21/22, with sixth grade students studying sound waves, seventh grade students studying contact forces, and eighth grade students studying chemical reactions and matter. RCMS adopted OSE this year and is engaged in a 3-year rollout of the program.



OSE is a rigorous, research-based curriculum that emphasizes student voice and lesson coherence, providing students with plentiful opportunities to engage in critical thinking and discourse.

The Randolph High School (RHS) science's program of studies has undergone serious revision as we plan for the introduction of academic pathways in biomedical science, engineering, and computer science. Interested students will have the opportunity to engage deeply within a pathway, developing the necessary knowledge and skills to succeed in these fields in college and the workforce.

## ELA Update

Our Elementary and Middle Schools are currently trying out our top candidates for new ELA curricular materials for next year. We have already rated the programs based on their materials, and are currently collecting data on the experience of the materials in the classrooms for both students and teachers.

## <u>History / Social Science Update</u>

We are pleased that our partnership with Generation Citizen is broadening our 8th Grade Civics curriculum to include a project-based action civics experience. Students are identifying topics of concern in their communities and will research the causes of these issues, and what can be done on a civic level to address them.



They will be conducting research, contacting community members, and preparing presentations that we will proudly share later this spring. The History Department is teaming up with the ELA teachers for an equity pause, when we take time to review our priorities, and name what we might do better to support equity and inclusion. We're going to focus on practices for reflecting on the materials we teach with–strengthening our culturally responsive pedagogical practices and building a better curriculum along the way.

This past winter athletics season was one of the most exciting in recent school history!

After losing the first game of the season, our Varsity Boys Basketball Team tallied 23 consecutive wins on their way to a Division IV State Championship where they defeated St Joseph's Prep 71-56 at the Tsongas Center in Lowell, MA. Four members of the team earned League All Star honors: Stevens Joacine, Malik White, Marquis White, and Lenny Tangishaka. Joacine was also named to the Boston Herald and Boston Globe All-Scholastic Team while Marquis White earned a spot on the Boston Globe's All-Tournament Team for his stellar playoff performance!

A celebratory rolling rally was held to cheer on the champions on Saturday, March 26th through Crawford Square to Town Hall. A summer parade is planned for July 3, 2022 to celebrate both the Randolph Blue Devils Basketball Team and the Randolph Superbowl football champions as grand marshals.



The Indoor Track team was highlighted by the Boys 4x200 Relay Team who won the Division V State Championship. They performed so well this season that they qualified for and competed in the Nike National Indoor Championship in New York City! The group of four: Carl Deye, Gardy Augustin, John Morgan, and Jaden Phillips all earned All-Star Honors. Augustin was also named the South Shore-Sullivan Track Athlete of the Year!

# Randolph High School World Languages Dept.

l. Randolph Public Schools will again participate in the *Massachusetts Seal of Biliteracy assessment*, which recognizes Grade 12 students who can speak, listen, read, and write in English and a language other than English. By offering the Seal of Biliteracy, we hope to honor the bilingual student community of Randolph High School and encourage more students to pursue bilingualism.

To earn the Seal of Biliteracy, students must meet the ELA graduation requirements. Graduating students **must also** demonstrate **proficiency** in a partner language. (languages available: Arabic, Chinese, Mandarin, French, Hindi, Italian, German, Hebrew, Japanese, Russian, Spanish, Korean, Polish, Haitian Creole).

When a student meets the criteria to be awarded the MA Seal of Biliteracy, an official state insignia is affixed to his/her high school diploma and transcript.





The purposes of the State Seal of Biliteracy are to:

l. Encourage students to study and master languages; Certify attainment of biliteracy skills; Provide employers with a method of identifying people with language and biliteracy skills; Provide universities with a method to recognize and give credit to applicants for the attainment of high-level skills in languages; Prepare students with skills that will benefit them in the labor market and the global society; and strengthen intergroup communication and honor the multiple cultures and languages in the community.
