Swap Auction



What is a Swap Auction?

A swap auction is a cashless alternative to finding new toys/items for your kids while helping to reduce waste; at the same time, they're an opportunity to clear out your pile of unwanted childrens' items. Students can donate an item(s) they no longer need in exchange for tickets they can use to then bid on a new to them item.

How it works:

Bring your gently used items, you no longer need, to trade for shopping points. Students will also receive bonus points for good behavior to use towards their shopping!

Use your points to bid on other students' items you would like to buy!

Take home items that are new to you!

What to bring?

You may bring any gently used, disinfected, item, that you no longer want, but think your classmates may still enjoy.

Some ideas are:

Books you've finished reading, video games you no longer play, extra art supplies, sports items, fashion accessories, toys



How this relates to our learning:

Sustainable

Second hand auctions are a great way both to bring students together and to remind everyone that what may be waste to one person may be happily reused by somebody else – meaning less useful stuff ending up in the bin. It also means less on your pocket, since it is estimated that in Brussels the average spend per child on toys is 294 euros annually! After a short usage, these items often end up in our landfills.
