Couse Description and Expectations

ESL II is a year-long course. ESL II builds on your English language skills: further developing your use and knowledge of grammar, sentence patterns, academic vocabulary, as well as your reading comprehension. Research projects, oral conversational practice, and presentations are included in this level. This class is designed to help you improve your ability to read and write the English language. Your goal is to refine your skills in reading comprehension and composition, as well as, your control of grammar, spelling, and language mechanics. You will also practice different learning strategies, and further develop your critical thinking skills.

Standards: We have five WIDA standards and the four domains of speaking, listening, reading, and writing are embedded in each of these. These standards as well as the Massachusetts State Curriculum Frameworks drive the context of our course work throughout the year.

Exams, Quizzes, Assignments, Homework

At various times throughout the course, quizzes may be given on vocabulary terms, grammar, and reading comprehension. At the end of the first semester there will be a midterm exam and at the end of the second semester there will be a comprehensive final exam.

These quizzes/ tests can include any combination of questions, including essay questions. There are also W.I.D.A. level appropriate informational reading assignments as well as abridged literary selections, short stories, poems etc. Research projects are also assigned in Google Slide Show. All quizzes and projects have a percentage of 0 - 100%, and carry the same weight as all other grades. Exams are graded in accordance with WHS exam policies.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is the practice of taking someone else's work whether written, a work of art, music, or ideas and passing them off as one's own. The WHS policy regarding this can be found on page 81 of the *Student Handbook*, and states:

". . . Any student who cheats/plagiarizes on an examination, or any other assignment, shall receive a zero, and may not make-up such work. . . ."

Furthermore, the instructor, will then notify the parent/guardian, and will speak to the student privately about the issue.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES
