We appreciate our many parents who dedicate their time to work with students weekly during Enrichment, and our community and business partners who mentor students and provide weekly opportunities for students to explore interests in club day.

We have many great opportunities lined up for students this semester



at TCI. Tri-County Schools understand the great benefits and outcomes STEM education brings to our students, and we are working together to enhance our STEM programming across all of our schools.

All students are immersed in STEM within each subject in the classrooms and attend our STEM Academy weekly. Our robotics teams are off to a great start in competitions at Klondike Middle School and Burnett Creek Elementary. All students are involved in one of twenty different clubs this year to explore their interests and be provided real-world experiences. Purdue University is working with our students in growing hydroponics at school. Purdue Professor, Dr. Krishna Nemali, engaged 3rd and 4th grade students in controlled environment agriculture last semester. This semester, he will be working with 5th and 6th grade students to understand the growing process with hydroponic systems. Students are growing fruits and vegetables and eating their harvest on our salad bar.

From The Desk of Mr. Haskins

All of our students are back in the groove of learning and well into their second semester of the school year. This stretch of winter months can be challenging for both students and staff, so keeping everyone focused and positive is the key until warmer weather arrives. As the third quarter grading period approaches its midpoint, we are already starting to look toward the 2020/21 school year. Our counselors have already set the master schedule for next year and have begun meeting with students to determine the courses that fit their future goals. We have some new programs planned in addition to adding some new course offerings in certain subject areas. I think our students are anxious for the new opportunities that are available to them.

This is an exciting time for me to be around our students as some great discussions have taken place in regards to their futures in education. It has been really enjoyable to have discussions with our seniors as their last semester of high school becomes a realization. Through these conversations, I have found that many of these students have already made plans for post graduation whether it be acceptance into a two or four year college of their choice or plans to enter the workforce. This is such a neat time for seniors, so I want them to really enjoy this time over these next few months here at school.

Many of our students continue to participate in our extracurricular activities through the winter months. Recently, I calculated that approximately 41% of all of our students are involved in an activity this time of year. Specifically, 44% of our females are involved in some activity, while only 38% of our males participate. My goal would be to continue to raise these percentage for both genders of student-athletes. I feel that so many positive experiences can come from being involved in extracurricular activities. Studies show that students involved in activities outside of the classroom have a tendency to develop better time management skills than those not involved, along with improving student social skills. I want to thank our community for all of the continual support that is given to our entire student body. It is so exciting for me to watch our students be involved in representing our school and the crowds that are always there to show support.

Lastly, just an update on our work based learning program. For the first semester, five of our students were placed in local businesses to learn skills that were directly related to one of the classes offered at the high school. As I have visited job sites to check on our students, I have been so impressed with how our students not only represent our school, but more importantly, how they represent themselves on the job. We have two more students that are scheduled to start work at two businesses this semester, so it should be another busy semester for our WBL program. If anyone is interested in learning more about this program, please feel free to stop out to discuss the possibilities for our students in the future.

Again as I mentioned earlier, thanks to the entire community for all the continued support that is given to all of our students in all three buildings.

Happy New Year to each of you. We are off to a great start in the new year and are looking forward to many exciting changes happening here in the nurse's office. She lives in Remington and has 3 grandchildren that are attending TCP. Mrs. Alberts is transitioning from the art room back to the nurse's office. Mrs. Alberts has 6 children attending both TCI and TCMS/HS. We are excited to collaborate as a team to provide your child with the best care possible.

We have started a Facebook page to keep you up to date with health related concerns, health information, and vaccinations. Check us out at Tri-County School Corporation School Nurses and like our page!

Flu Season is here. If you have not been vaccinated for the flu there is still time! Remember to keep your child home from school if they have a fever of 100.0 or >. Children should remain fever free x 24 hours without the aid of Tylenol or Ibuprofen before returning to school. Students should also remain home if they have vomiting or diarrhea. A child that is repeatedly coughing and not feeling well would be better served by staying at home to rest.

Cold weather reminder *Please send your child to school ready to play outside with coats, gloves, and hats to keep them warm. Students will go outside for recess unless the temperatures is less than 20 degrees.

Immunizations are an important part of what we do. Kindergarten, sixth grade, and seniors are the big immunization years for school-aged children. If you have a child that will be entering one of these grades in the fall, please work on getting their immunization records updated. We will have a strict school wide policy next fall pertaining to immunizations. Students that are not up to date with all immunizations within the first 28 days of school will be excluded from school until their immunization status meets state requirements. We appreciate your help in keeping your child's health and the health of all of our students a top priority.

FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

While watching a recent Purdue basketball game, I am always intrigued and impressed with the coaching involved for both teams. It consistently amazes me how the coaches find ways to motivate their student-athletes to accomplish success at the highest level.

Coaching is very similar to teaching. In fact, I firmly believe that to be a successful teacher, a person must coach or instruct outside the classroom at some point. The skills required to be a great coach translate seamlessly into the classroom. With that being said, I recently read a piece by Annette Breaux entitled "Teaching Like a Great Coach." Please read and enjoy it.

"Have you ever watched a great coach in action? It's poetry in motion. Great coaches are great teachers. Their lesson plans (game plans) are always evolving; they would never dream of using the same game plan over and over because they know that what works with this year's team may not work with next year's team. Great coaches make each player aware of his strengths and his weaknesses. But they do not focus on the weaknesses; instead, they develop plans to help each player overcome them. The coaches main focus, though, remains on the player's strengths. Great coaches work tirelessly, far beyond the normal working hours, to make the most of each player's strengths. They know the value of the procedure and practice them over and over with their players. Great coaches are always writing and delivering motivational speeches because they know that players need daily doses of inspiration. They teach players of all abilities, so there's no such thing as one-size-fits-all coaching. They never sit still; when they are in the presence of their players, they are walking around constantly, monitoring, encouraging, coaching, teaching, and remediating. A great coach will never be found sitting at his desk on the sideline. He has a desk in his office, but he only uses it when the players are not around. On game day, he's pacing back and forth, watching every move his players make. No, he cannot go onto the field and play the game for them. He has prepared them and must now let them play. But he is watching constantly, offering encouragement and guidance. When something stops working, a great coach calls a time-out and the teachers and redirects.

Do you see where this is going? Great coaches are great teachers, and great teachers are great coaches. Their content and their arena may differ, but the coaching and teaching processes are remarkably similar."

Great coaches, like great teachers, sole focus is student success. After building positive relationships with students, coaches and teachers can push students to limits never expected. Success has many different definitions. For a basketball team, success is measured most often by wins and losses. However, there are other, perhaps more important, measures of success in athletics and in the classroom.

Wins and losses, test scores, and grades are measures of success, but they are not the only measures of success for the teachers, staff, and coaches at Tri-County. Tri-County is committed to empowering student to embrace challenges. Being committed to embracing challenges will result in failure at times, but embracing challenges will also provide opportunities for personal and academic growth.

The teachers, staff, and coaches of Tri-County are committed to ensuring our students are successful, not measured by grades or test scores. Rather, we are committed to student success and learning as measured by exceeding individual expectations and surpassing goals.
