Business Bell Work - Volume 1

DIRECTIONS FOR USE:

Decide how you would like to assign the bell work. Your choices are:

- Click to <u>make a copy</u> of the Google Presentation and either share it with your students or assign it via Google Classroom.
- 2. Provide the PowerPoint file to your students.
- 3. Print and copy the PDF.
 - This is the least appealing option because your students cannot click the links provided in the student portion. However, if you have limited technology and/or your technology goes down, this option is available.

At the beginning of the semester, explain to students the bell work procedure. If you are grading it, let them know how from the start as well. Here is an example script:

"When you get to class each day, you will log in, check the plan, and then begin Business Bell Work in Google Classroom. The weeks are numbered. You will do the day of the week (Monday, Tuesday, etc.) of the current week. It will be graded at random. I won't grade them daily, but I will grade them so make sure you're doing the current bell work when you get to class daily. In addition, we will often start class with a discussion based on the day's bell work. What questions do you have so far?"

Use the Answer Key to facilitate class discussion when time allows. Honestly, sometimes my class ends up spending 15 minutes or more on bell work depending on additional resources and their interest in the topic!

Soft Skill Saturday is a bonus that provides an additional mini lesson/class discussion each week. Incorporate this bonus content any day of the week! TIP: It's great for filling the last few minutes of class when a lesson ends earlier than expected!

FIND IT FRIDAY

Answers will vary, but should not include non-profit companies.


For profit company:

 make/provide things that can be sold for more money than it costs to make/provide it; goal is to maximize profit/make money! Ex: Coca-Cola, Microsoft, Adidas, etc.

Non-profit company:

make enough money to cover costs, but not extra; main goal is to support a cause. Ex:
 American Cancer Society, Make a Wish foundation, Boy Scouts of America, etc.

<u>SOFT SKILL SATURDAY</u> (Consider using the <u>Employability Skills Growth Assessment</u> - it's FREE!) Verbal communication includes any spoken word - to a large group, small group, between two people or even to yourself! Check out this <u>fun little game</u> to practice verbal communication.

Gross Domestic Product


• Aka GDP - the sum of the market values, or prices, of all final goods and services produced in an economy during a period of time

Unemployment Rate

• the percentage of unemployed workers in the total labor force. Workers are considered unemployed if they currently do not work, despite the fact that they are able and willing to do so. The total labor force consists of all employed and unemployed people within an economy

Business Cycle

 a cycle or series of cycles of economic expansion and contraction; expansion, recession, depression, recovery, expansion, and over again <u>Picture Source</u> →

THANKFUL THURSDAY

Encourage students to come up with something they haven't used in weeks past. Give examples when needed. Could be something as small as running water, someone doing something for you, warm feet on a cold day, etc.

FIND IT FRIDAY

Example from bell work:

To compete with Home Depot and Lowes, Bronson Electric, a small local supplier of lighting fixtures, took a look at their customer's needs. Many needed a place to park their trucks, a small office space to prepare invoices, and a software system for contractors to key in their needs for the next day's work. Overnight, Bronson employees loaded the fixtures onto their trucks. These additional services helped them serve the needs of customers even better than large companies could!

Trade Barrier

 government-induced restrictions on international trade. Most trade barriers work on the same principle: the imposition of some sort of cost on trade that raises the price or availability of the traded products

Business Ethics

• the study of proper business policies and practices regarding potentially controversial issues Here is a <u>video</u> describing this term from Investopedia.

Social Responsibility

• the idea that businesses should balance profit-making activities with activities that benefit society. Here is a <u>video</u> about it from Investopedia.

Contract

 a binding agreement between two or more persons or parties; a business arrangement for the supply of goods or services at a fixed price; usually legally binding

If you would like your students to explore ethics further, check out <u>Ethical Dilemma in the News</u>. It can be used as a sub plan!

- Culture is defined as the customary beliefs, social forms, and material traits of a racial, religious, or social group
- Subculture is an ethnic, regional, economic, or social group exhibiting characteristic patterns of behavior sufficient to distinguish it from others within an embracing culture or society. A culture within a culture.
- It's important to understand a country's business subculture so that you can create products and promotional materials to reach them (not offend or embarass).

THANKFUL THURSDAY:

Encourage students to come up with something they haven't used yet. Give examples when needed.

FIND IT FRIDAY:

Find a product that assists people with special needs. (You may find something unique online or come up with your own idea!)

Example from bell work:

A product to assist people with special needs - sugar free ice cream for diabetics.

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

Click here for <u>a 3.5 minute video</u> pertaining to time management from Entrepreneur Network.

Check out the <u>Podcast Preview</u> (FREE). It can be used with any podcast, but here is a series on time management and productivity called <u>The Productivityist</u>. The Podcast Preview can be a regular task in your classroom! Just have students choose a business podcast if they finish other classwork before their classmates. Here is a <u>list</u> or just have them search for one on their own. :)

 - Examples from **Investopedia**:
 - Chipotle To change the way people think about and eat fast food.
 - Nike To bring inspiration and innovation to every athlete in the world.
 - Tesla To accelerate the world's transition to sustainable energy.

Organizational Chart

a diagram that outlines the internal structure of a company. It outlines the roles, responsibilities and relationships between individuals within an organization. It's like a business's family tree

Animated Dissection of Anatomy for Medicine (A.D.A.M.) is an Atlanta-based company that provides interactive medical info. A major product of A.D.A.M. is its extensive multimedia medical encyclopedia covering 3,500 diseases and conditions.

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

According to <u>The Balance</u>, conflict resolution is a job requirement for many different types of positions because conflict within organizations can reduce productivity and create a difficult work environment, leading to unwanted turnover in staff and reduced morale.

If you have time, show this 11 minute video from TEDx Talks called Finding Confidence in Conflict. Here is a Conflict Resolution Graphic Organizer to guide class discussion on the topic.

 - a written document that describes in detail how a business, usually a new one, is going to achieve its goals
 - Here is a <u>video</u> describing this term from Investopedia.

WORLDLY WEDNESDAY:

 - According to <u>The Startup</u>, they are English, Mandarin Chinese, Spanish, German, and Portuguese.
- 2. How is nonverbal communication different from other forms of communication?
 - It doesn't use speech. It's all of the unspoken communication such as facial expressions, hand gestures, etc.
- 3. How does nonverbal communication vary between countries? Find an example.
 - Different cultures have different nonverbal customs. Ex: According to <u>The Balance</u>, in Asia, Africa, and Latin American cultures one should be careful about the eye contact made with anyone that could be seen as a social (or workplace) superior.

THANKFUL THURSDAY:

Encourage students to come up with something they haven't used yet. Give examples when needed.

FIND IT FRIDAY:

A legal method of payment other than cash, check, or credit card.

PayPal example from bell work. Another is <u>Venmo</u> (click the link to learn more).

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

Ability to follow directions: You will be given directions for the rest of your life. Even if you own your own business, you have to follow directions to pay taxes or set up an account online.

- a leadership role that is not part of a formal structure; Example: well-liked coworker FURTHER DISCUSSION POINTS:
 - Do you think formal or informal influence is more important? Could someone have both?
 - Should people who have this type of influence work well together? What would it mean for a business where they did not?

WORLDLY WEDNESDAY:

Choose one of the following forms of nonverbal communication and find examples of how it differs in other countries. (eye contact, personal space, color, numbers, emblems, smells, other)

- <u>personal space</u> According to <u>How Stuff Works</u>, Argentinians prefer the least space between strangers and Romanians prefer the most. (Link has graph with numerous countries and an entertaining video, but preview the video first. Though entertaining, I DO NOT show it.)
- color check out this video titled Color Meanings in Different Cultures.

THANKFUL THURSDAY:

Encourage students to come up with something they haven't used yet. Give examples when needed.

FIND IT FRIDAY:

A way to communicate difficult information. It's all about customer service - internal and external (employees and people who buy stuff from your business). What are your ideas?

Example from bell work:

Discover Card worked with Hallmark Cards to create greeting cards to remind customers of their delinquent accounts. This "soft-sell" approach helps Discover better work with late payers. It has resulted in people paying faster and created loyal customers.

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

Punctuality is being on time. Just as there are times to use more formal vs. informal language, there are times when punctuality is more important than others. What examples can you think of?

- an association of workers united as a single, representative entity for the purpose of improving the workers' economic status and working conditions through collective bargaining with employers

Compensation

• The ways in which employees are paid for their work - not only money, also benefits such as health insurance, paid vacation, etc.

Encourage students to come up with something they haven't used yet. Give examples when needed.

FIND IT FRIDAY:

An idea that could be the basis for a startup company.

Example from the bell work:

Karen Neuburger was a stay-at-home mom who created comfortable, oversized pajamas to wear around the house. Then she realized others might also want this product. Now she is CEO of a company that specializes is pajamas, pillows, socks, and other comfort products.

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

According to <u>Indeed Career Guide</u>, problem-solving skills help you determine the source of a problem and find an effective solution. Some key problem-solving skills include: active listening, analysis, research, creativity, communication, dependability, decision making, and team-building.

Mentor

 According to <u>The Balance</u>, it is someone who shares their knowledge and expertise with you in order to help you set goals, fix problems, and make good choices along your career path.

• a written document submitted with a job application explaining the applicant's credentials and interest in the open position

Resume

- a one- to two-page formal document submitted to job recruiters as means of showing a list of an applicant's work experience, education and skills.
- should give the potential employer enough info to believe you are worth interviewing.
 Video from Harvard Extension School called "How to Write a Great Resume and Cover Letter" (2:44)

WORLDLY WEDNESDAY:

- 1. Why do governments establish trade barriers to discourage international business?

 According to Investopedia, barriers to trade such as tariffs are established to protect emerging industries, as national defense, to protect domestic employment, to mitigate aggressive trade practices by other countries, and because of environmental concerns.

 Opinion, although many economists believe free trade is best, there are solid arguments for and against trade barriers.

THANKFUL THURSDAY:

FIND IT FRIDAY:

Example from bell work:

After achieving success as a lawyer, Gene Wade was drawn to helping students. He is the head of Platform Learning, a tutoring service that assists over 50,000 underprivileged students each year. The organization tutors students to "Believe... Achieve... Succeed."

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

According to <u>SkillsYouNeed</u>, active listening is fully concentrating on what is being said rather than just passively 'hearing' the message of the speaker.

How could you develop these skills? (practice non-verbal signs of active listening: smile, eye-contact, posture, mirroring, avoiding distraction AND verbal signs: positive reinforcement, remembering, questioning, reflection, clarification, summarization. (More on this at the link above.)

Check out this clip posted by krump4you from The Big Bang Theory as an example. Can you catch the verbal and non-verbal signs?

Target Market

• a targeted set of customers for whom a business directs its marketing efforts. If you'd like your students to explore reaching specific customers, check out the <u>Target Market Identification Stations</u>.

Aggressive companies in some regions of the world commonly use payoffs to gain access to new markets. Some countries consider bribes to be tax deductible business expenses. However, US companies can face hefty fines and even prison sentences when US laws are violated. THANKFUL THURSDAY:

Encourage students to come up with something they haven't used yet and share with others!

FIND IT FRIDAY:

Innovative way to conserve a natural resource; example from bell work is for water.

SOFT SKILL SATURDAY:

Check out this video (4:14) about strong work ethic posted by Grow Successful.

- 1. Do you agree with this video? Explain why or why not.
- 2. Is there a point when "hard work" reaches its limit? (Yes, if we are overtired, we are less productive/make mistakes!)
- 3. How do you know when you reach your limit?
- 4. What is something YOU will do to either heed your limits or increase your work ethic?
 - Heed limits: make an effort to go to bed before a certain time every night,
 - Increase work ethic: stop binge watching TV (or at least not start a new series), only "play" after work is done, etc.

- a work arrangement in which the employee works outside the office such as at home, coffee shops, libraries, and various other venues; aka working from home or e-commuting

Artificial Intelligence

- According to <u>Techopedia</u>, Al is an area of computer science that emphasizes the creation of
 intelligent machines that work and react like humans. Some of the activities computers with
 artificial intelligence are designed for include: speech recognition, learning, planning, and
 problem solving.

Principal is \$400.60 Interest Rate is $1.5\% \rightarrow 0.015$ Time is 6 months $\rightarrow \frac{1}{2} \rightarrow 0.5$

\$400.60 x 0.015 x 0.5 = \$3.0045, rounded to \$3.0

The interest for 6 months is \$3.00.

TERM TUESDAY:

Just-In-Time

• a management strategy that aligns raw material orders from suppliers directly with production schedules. Click for an article and short video on JIT from Investopedia.

Logistics

 According to <u>LoadDelivered Logistics</u>, it is planning, implementing, and controlling the flow of raw materials, inventory, and finished goods to the point of consumption. Click for a <u>video</u> using bottled water as an example.

Manufacturing

• the process of converting raw materials, components, and/or parts into finished goods

MATH MONDAY:

Principal x interest rate x time (in years)

\$1,200 x 0.025 x 3/12 = \$7.50 for the first three months $2.5\% \rightarrow 0.025$ 3/12 is 3 months

\$1,200 x 0.0215 x 3/12 = \$6.45 for the next three months $2.15\% \rightarrow 0.0215$

\$7.50 + \$6.45 = \$13.95 for six months

Business Risk

- Anything that threatens a company's ability to meet its target or achieve its financial goals.

Insurance

- a contract, represented by a policy, in which an individual or entity receives financial protection or reimbursement against losses from an insurance company.

MATH MONDAY:

Interest rate is $5.2\% \rightarrow 0.052$ 6 months $\rightarrow 6/12 \rightarrow 0.5$

Withdrawal x interest rate x time = penalty for early withdrawal $\$800 \times 0.052 \times 6/12 = \20.80 penalty

\$800.00 - \$20.80 = \$779.20 withdrawal after penalty

TERM TUESDAY:

Class Action

- a legal action undertaken by one or more plaintiffs on behalf of themselves and all other persons having an identical interest in the alleged wrong.
 - Check out this <u>Class Action Database</u> from Consumer Action.

Implied Warranty

• a legal term for the assurances – written or oral – that a product is fit for the purpose intended and is merchantable

Express Warranty

 an agreement between the contract seller and the buyer of a product to provide repair or replacement for covered components of the product for some specified time period

Here is a video from InHouseOwl to explain the difference between implied and express warranties.

WORLDLY WEDNESDAY:

Countertrade is a reciprocal form of international trade in which goods or services are exchanged for other goods or services rather than for hard currency. It is more common in lesser-developed countries with limited foreign exchange or credit facilities. Types: barter, counterpurchase, and offset.

MATH MONDAY:

 $10\% \to 0.10$

Loan amount x interest x time = interest $$6,500 \times 0.10 \times 2 = $1,300$

Loan amount + interest = total amount to repay \$6,500 + \$1,300 = \$7,800

TERM TUESDAY:

Fixed Expense

 According to <u>MyMoneyCoach</u>, a fixed expenses is any expense that does not change from period to period such as rent, property taxes, insurance, loan payments, etc.

Net Worth

• the difference between assets and liabilities; click for a video from Investopedia.

Financial Plan

- a comprehensive evaluation of current and future financial state by using currently known variables to predict future cash flows, asset values and withdrawal plans.
 - Here is an <u>article</u> from The Balance about writing the financial plan for a business.

MATH MONDAY:

 $$38 \times 36 \text{ months} = $1,368 \text{ total monthly payments}$

\$1,368 + \$100 down = \$1,468 payment plan price

\$1,468 payment plan price - \$1,200 cash price = \$268 finance charge (more \$ to pay over time)

\$268 / \$1,200 = 0.223 or 22.333% The installment price is 22.33% more expensive than cash.

TERM TUESDAY:

FDIC

• The <u>Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation</u> preserves and promotes public confidence in the U.S. financial system by insuring deposits in banks and thrift institutions for at least \$250,000.

Commercial Bank

 a type of financial institution that accepts deposits, offers checking account services, makes various loans, and offers basic financial products like certificates of deposit (CDs) and savings accounts to individuals and small businesses

Credit Union

 credit institutions that are created, owned, and operated by their participants; not-for-profit enterprises that enjoy tax-exempt status

12 months x monthly finance charge of \$33.80 = \$405.60

\$50 + \$8.40 + 405.60 = \$464 total cost of credit card for the year

TERM TUESDAY:

Bankruptcy

• a legal term for when a person or business cannot repay their outstanding debts; click for a <u>video</u> from Investopedia.

Credit Rating

• an assessment of the creditworthiness of a borrower in general terms or with respect to a particular debt or financial obligation; here is the Investopedia <u>video</u>.

Interest

- a charge for borrowed money generally a percentage of the amount borrowed
 - Click for a <u>compound interest calculator</u> from Investor.gov to see how savings can grow!

25 years x 12 months/year = 300 months

300 months x \$540.27/month = \$162,081 total payments

\$162,081 payments - \$70,000 loan = \$92,081 in interest paid over 25 years

TERM TUESDAY:

Depreciation

- an accounting method of allocating the cost of a tangible asset over its useful life and is used to account for declines in value
