

3 OPTIONS TERMS

Define GDL - See page 16 in the manual.

Driving School Instructor must be from an approved commercial driving school giving instruction in a dual brake vehicle.

Supervising Driver must be age 21 or older, driving for at least 3 years and have a NJ driver license.

"Practice driving" is the period of time when a person has a permit.

A dependent is your child or any adult whose welfare is your responsibility. You probably don't have any.

A GDL restriction for permit or probationary drivers is no driving between 11:01pm to 5:00am. That means that you CAN drive between 5:00am to 11:00pm.

\$100.00 fine if you do not comply with the GDL restrictions.

Suspensions and Postponements will effect when a Probationary and Full Basic Unrestricted license can be issued.

Minimum Age to obtain a full basic unrestricted license is 18.

Red Decal - Two red decals must be attached to the license plate. One must be attached to the front license plate and one on the back license plate.

Tips on Passing Your Road Test

DASHBOARD/INSTRUMENT PANEL ASSIGNMENT

Using the attached paper make a sketch of a dashboard. Use the vehicle you are most likely to be driving when you get your permit. If you are not sure what vehicle you will be driving, then use any family member's vehicle. The sketch will include the instrument panel as well as the dashboard. This will be graded as a test.

Include the following items by using their symbol somewhere on the sketch. Use the letters below when labeling each symbol. Use one color for the sketch and another color for the letter that represents the symbol. Do not confuse indicators with switches. If the vehicle has a console, draw it on the <u>back</u> of the sketch. Do not include and instruments you are NOT required to have on the sketch. Sketch it the way you see it. Put your name and class color on the back of the sketch. Do not use the color red on the dashboard sketch.

Sketch letters A-Z are worth 4 points each.

- A ABS indicator
- C. Oil pressure light or gauge
- E. Engine temperature light or gauge
- G. Electrical system light or gauge (battery)
- I. Brake system warning light (Not ABS)
- K. Ignition/Starter Switch or Button
- M. Emergency flasher/hazard indicator
- R. Emergency flasher/hazard control switch
- T. Fuel gauge & show how much gas is in the car
- W. Headlight switch
- Z. Gear selection indicator & indicate what gear the car is in.

- B. Speedometer
- D. Odometer with exact mileage
- F. Gear selection lever
- H. High beam indicator
- J. Parking Brake indicator
- L. Turn signal lever
- P. Turn signal indicators
- S. Seat belt indicator
- V. Windshield wiper switch

PASSIVE SAFETY DEVICES

Passive Safety Devices

New Jersey Law

Driver Education

<u>Permit or Probationary License Drivers (GDL)</u> and their passengers must be properly restrained in a seat belt or child safety seat/booster seat regardless of where they are seated in the vehicle.

- ❖ It is a primary offense. A police officer can pull over the vehicle just because the driver or passengers aren't properly restrained.
- The driver is responsible for themselves and passengers under age 18. The driver will get the ticket
- ❖ Passengers 18 and over are responsible for themselves. The passenger will get the ticket
- ❖ The driver may also get a ticket for violating a GDL restriction.

Once a driver is fully licensed (no longer GDL) all passengers must be properly restrained in a seat belt or child safety seat/booster seat regardless of where they're sitting in the vehicle.

- It is a primary offense if the DRIVER, FRONT SEAT PASSENGERS (regardless of age), OR PASSENGERS UNDER 18 (regardless of where they are seated) are not properly restrained. The driver will get the ticket if the unrestricted passenger is under 18. If the passenger is 18+, that passenger will get the ticket.
- It is a secondary offense if a passenger 18 or older is unrestrained in the back seat. If the vehicle is pulled over by the police for any primary offense (including the driver not wear a seat belt) the 18+ passenger will get the ticket.

Car Seats – Child Restraints – NJ Law Effective 9/1/2015

Always check the manufacture's instruction, YouTube site, and label to ensure the proper weight, height, and usage. Children are safest in the back seat. Never place a rear facing car seat in the front passengers seat with an active airbag.



How Does a Teenager Cross the Road?

Older teens now account for half of all pedestrian deaths among children 19 and under. In the last five years, pedestrian injuries among 16-19 year olds increased 25% over the previous five years.

How big a problem is distraction? To find out, Safe Kids observed 34,325 middle and high school students crossing the street in a school zone. Here's what we learned.



One in five high schoolers and one in eight middle schoolers were observed crossing the street while distracted.



Teens who were distracted were most frequently texting or wearing headphones.







