Each MLTI cycle last four years. This is the fourth and final school year of the current cycle. Right now we don't know what form the next cycle will be like, starting in July of 2013.

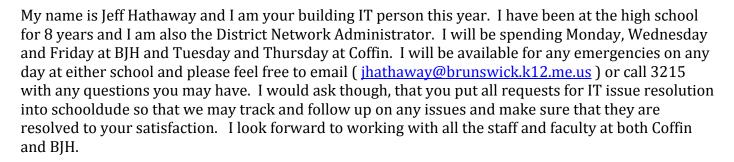
