
THE TELL-TALE HEART

CONSTRUCTED RESPONSE ACTIVITY



DIGITAL OR IN-CLASS VERSION

USING DIRECT QUOTES & PROVIDING ANALYSIS

IN-PERSON

DIRECTIONS

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- one copy of each insanity test, posted at stations around the room/hallway/walls
- *at least one highlighter, each a different color, at each insanity test station
- one copy of the answer sheet for each student or group
- a copy of the text for each student or group

If you don't have enough copies or are using a textbook, you could have students lightly underline the quotes in pencil or use sticky notes, etc. instead of highlighting

OBJECTIVES:

- Students will visit each station & complete the tasks on the answer sheet.
- At each **insanity test station**, students will use the test to determine whether or not the main character from the story qualifies as INSANE or NOT. Then, using the highlighter at each station, they will highlight the quote that best supports their answer.
- At the **degree of murder station**, students will follow the flowchart to determine which degree of murder the main character would be charged with. On their answer sheet, they must write 2-3 sentences explaining their decision.
- At the end, it's time for the **assessment** (back of answer sheet). Students choose ONE of the insanity stations they visited and write a constructed response paragraph utilizing the quote they highlighted and explaining how that evidence proves their answer.

OBJECTIVES:

- In the Google Form, students are introduced to each of the four insanity tests that are used/have been used in the United States for insanity pleas.
- At each **insanity test**, students will use the test to determine whether or not the main character from the story qualifies as INSANE or NOT.
- Then, at each insanity test, students must find a direct quote from the text that supports their answer. (They can copy+paste the quote from the online version of the text.)
- After that, they must explain why that quote proves their answer.
- At the **degree of murder question**, students will follow the flowchart to determine which degree of murder the main character would be charged with. Then, they must write 2-3 sentences explaining their decision.

THE M'NAGHTEN RULE

Did the person understand the nature of their actions?

For example, did they understand that their actions were going to take a life?

YES = not insane NO = insane

MORAL PENAL CODE

Did the person understand that their actions were wrong or criminal?

For example, did they know they could get in trouble because of their actions?

YES = not insane NO = insane

IRRESISTABLE IMPULSE

Was the person **powerless or unable to control their actions**due to mental illness?

For example, did they know it was wrong but their mental illness caused them to have no self-control?

YES = insane NO = not insane

THE DURHAM RULE

Did a diagnosed mental disease or defect cause them to commit the crime?

For example, did they hear voices telling them to do it? Was it a "command from God?" Did they think the victim was a demon?

YES = insane NO = not insane

WHAT'S THE CHARGE?

Follow the flowchart to determine what the main character will be charged with.

First-degree murder?

Second-degree murder?

Manslaughter

Guilty but Insane?

WHAT SHOULD CHARGE BE?

Follow this chart to determine what the main character should be charged with.

The main character committed murder.



The main character committed a criminal act.



Does the main character qualify as "INSANE" by any of the insanity Defense Tests?



Guilty but not criminally responsible.

IF NO, THEN ASK 📗



Was it accidental or self-defense?



Guilty of manslaughter.

IF NO, THEN ASK 🖖



Guilty of seconddegree murder.

Was it planned?



Guilty of first-degree murder.
