LES Classe di Italiano - Mrs. Cinzia Neary

In second and third grade Italian classes, students have been working on pronouncing and identifying the days of the week and numbers from 0 to 31. A typical Italian class begins with the "Buongiorno" song and then students are immediately immersed into new Italian vocabulary! Students view slides of the targeted vocabulary, sing and dance to catchy songs to help with memorization of the new words, and play word games on Conjuguemos to reinforce the correct spelling of the words. Once students have a good understanding of the new vocabulary, students are given a question to answer. For example, "Che giorno è oggi?" (What day is today?) or "Che giorno era ieri?" (What day was yesterday?) are the types of questions that students are asked to respond to. Asking and answering questions in Italian helps students apply knowledge of their new words into functional conversational language. The next Italian unit focuses on the months of the year. By the end of this unit students will be able to say the date, their birthdays, and tell how old they are! I am extremely pleased with the students' work, passion, and enthusiasm they have for the Italian language. I am looking forward to seeing students progress in their language acquisition of Italian.
