WHAT IS TOY PHOTOGRAPHY?

- TOY PHOTOGRAPHY IS USING INANIMATE OBJECTS TO CREATE THE FEELINGS OF <u>MOVEMENT</u> AND <u>EMOTION</u>.
- TOYS CAN BE USED TO CREATE IMAGES THAT TELL A LARGER **<u>Story</u>**.
- OFTEN INVOLVES TAKING <u>CLOSE-UP SHOTS</u> AND MOVING AROUND YOUR SETTING TO GAIN BETTER VIEWPOINTS AND CHANGE <u>Perspectives</u>.



SHALLOW DEPTH OF FIELD

A PHOTOGRAPHIC TECHNIQUE THAT YOU CAN USE TO <u>MAKE YOUR TOY 'SUBJECTS' STAND OUT.</u> A SMALL AREA IN THE <u>FOREGROUND IS IN FOCUS</u>, WHILE THE <u>BACKGROUND IS BLURRED</u>. THIS HELPS KEEP THE BACKGROUND FROM DISTRACTING THE VIEWER.



HOW CAN I USE MY CAMERA PHONE TO CREATE SHALLOW DEPTH OF FIELD?

- YOU CAN ACHIEVE THIS WITH A DSLR CAMERA BY SETTING YOUR CAMERA ON APERTURE PRIORITY (A) MODE WITH THE LOWEST "F" SETTING.
- YOU CAN ALSO ACHIEVE THIS ON YOUR CAMERA PHONE BY PLACING YOUR PHONE VERY CLOSE TO THE TOY(S) AND MAKE SURE YOUR SUBJECT IS IN FOCUS. BY SWITCHING TO 'PORTRAIT MODE'. SOME CAMERA PHONES HAVE 'PORTRAIT MODE', WHICH IS A BUILT IN FEATURE THAT CREATES A SHALLOW DEPTH OF FIELD.

FORCED PERSPECTIVE?

- **FORCED PERSPECTIVE** IS A TECHNIQUE YOU CAN USE TO CREATE AN OPTICAL ILLUSION
- CAN MAKE AN OBJECT APPEAR FARTHER AWAY, CLOSER, LARGER OR SMALLER THAN IT ACTUALLY IS.

• YOU CAN MAKE A TOY LOOK HUGE BY PUTTING IT VERY CLOSE TO THE CAMERA.

PROJECT DIRECTIONS:

- 1. DECIDE WHICH TOY(S) YOU WOULD LIKE TO USE FOR YOUR PROJECT & THINK ABOUT WHAT <u>LOCATION</u> YOU WOULD LIKE TO PUT THEM IN. What <u>Action</u> could they be doing in that setting?
- 1. GET TO WORK AND <u>SET UP YOUR SCENE</u>.
- 2. GET CLOSE UP TO YOUR TOY(S) AND GET DOWN TO THEIR LEVEL.

USING A CELL PHONE, TABLET OR DIGITAL CAMERA, TAKE SOME PHOTOS AT DIFFERENT ANGLES, FROM THEIR POINT OF VIEW.

- 1. LOOK AT YOUR PHOTOS AND PICK THE ONE YOU LIKE THE BEST. (APPLYING A FILTER IS OPTIONAL)
- 2. GIVE YOUR PHOTOGRAPH A "<u>TITLE"</u>.
