Pick Up – Drop Off

" ROAR"

Many know that the Trahan for years has had TOPPER (Trahan Offers Pride, Promise, Encouragement and Respect) as a successful positive climate school-wide program. This program includes "Topper" (the tiger), our school mascot, who roams the front lobby. As part of TOPPER, we have the program "ROAR" (Respect, Offer Help, Aim to Achieve, and Responsibility). This is a "Catch'em doing something good" program in which students who show Respect, Offer help, Aim to achieve and exhibit Responsibility are recognized. Some of the components of the program are described below:

- a. Tiger Tickets are distributed by staff members to those students who are found to exhibit characteristics of ROAR.
- Periodic intercom announcements are made describing/explaining/providing examples of the components of ROAR.
- c. Weekly raffle (Fridays) of Tiger Tickets in which students are recognized and receive a certificate and a pencil for exhibiting desired "ROAR-like" behavior. Winners are called on the intercom!

This program excites the students and has been very successful. It is one of the many strategies we use at the Trahan to ensure a safe, positive and warm school environment.



You child may complete any tests that have been assigned. You will notice a weekly quiz with twenty questions will also be assigned. It is a requirement that this quiz be completed each week. We have also been introduced to Accelerated Reader, where students can earn points by taking quizzes on stories they have read. This can be done at home or at school. AR is an incentive program to promote life-long readers.

Welcome to Room 17! We have been very busy so far this year working hard to become a responsible, respectful classroom community. Each morning Room 17 begins the day with Morning Meeting. The purpose of Morning Meeting is to help build a community and create a climate of trust. It also gives students daily practice in respectful communication. As a community, we have challenged ourselves to become more responsible students this year, both academically and socially.

We have jumped right into the new Go Math curriculum with the determination to try something new, even if it may be challenging or different at first! We are realizing the importance of knowing our basic multiplication, addition, and subtraction facts. Having these facts memorized makes our daily lessons run much smoother! Continue to practice these facts at home– flashcards are a great strategy!

During Reader's Workshop we have just wrapped up Theme 1-- Facing Challenges. The students worked hard and are understanding that when we respond to a story we should include details and voice in our writing! In Social Studies we have been learning about different landforms and bodies of water. We are now moving into map skills. In Science we have been conducting mini experiments in class to help us become familiar with the scientific method. We discovered how many pennies could fit in a cup filled to the top with water. We also discovered which ball would hit the ground first; a playground ball or a tennis ball. Last, we discovered what happens when syrup, oil, and water are poured into the same cup! Ask your student about these experiments!

Something special Room 17 got to do this year is watch the Disney Movie Holes after finishing a whole class read aloud of the book. We had a chance to compare and contrast the similarities and differences between the two! Room 17 is off to a great start!

Nurse News

I would like to welcome everyone back to school this year. We are off to a great start. As usual, the nurse's office has been busy with a lot of playground casualties. Some rules to remember:

It is very important to keep your child's medical information up- to- date in case we need to reach you in an emergency. Please call or send in a note with new work, home, or cell numbers.

Please make sure that all of your child's necessary medications are at school- this means everything from Tylenol to Epipens- with the appropriate physician's orders. We do not have any extra stock that we can hand out. Cough drops are considered medication and are not allowed in any of the Tewksbury schools.

If your child is absent- please call the school and send a note in after they return stating the reason for the absence. If you do not call the school, expect a phone call.

If you are going on vacation- please send a note to the teacher before you leave. If your child sees a doctor for his/her illness or injury, please get a doctor's note for the school nurse.

Please remind your children not to share combs, headbands, hats, etc – anything that touches the head -with their friends.

Please keep your child home if he/she has a fever, constant cough, green or yellow nasal drainage, any eye drainage, diarrhea, and / or vomiting. Otherwise, you will be getting a phone call to come pick him/ her up.

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Nurse News cont.

At this age it is important to start talking to your children about their changing hygiene needs. Your children are growing up and their bodies are changing. Many third and fourth graders will need to use deodorant every day. Showering and washing hair daily along with clean clothes becomes a necessity due to hormonal increases. Brushing teeth before school every morning and at bedtime should be part of the normal routine at home. All of these steps help to build a positive body image, increase self-esteem, and develop a healthy lifestyle that will impact the rest of his/her life. Children who appear to be unclean or smell of body odor are at risk of being made fun of by the other children.

As the weather gets cooler, please make sure that your child has on appropriate clothing and footwear for the season. If your child is not dressed warmly enough, he/she will have to stay inside during recess for safety reasons. Flip-flops are never appropriate footwear at school during any season. Children get injured climbing playground equipment and running on pavement, especially when wearing flip-flops. Please send your children to school in sneakers.

This fall we will be doing our annual vision and hearing screenings. If there are any issues, parents will be contacted. The fourth grade students will also being having height, weight, and BMI screenings. All fourth grade parents will be receiving a letter later in the year with that information. If you have any questions or concerns, feel free to call me.

Reading News Mrs Graves



It was a busy start to the school year with the testing of students for eligibility in the reading program. Students who were found eligible for additional reading help receive supplementary reading instruction in the areas of vocabulary, word attack skills, reading comprehension and fluency. Most of the children are seen in small groups approximately three days per week.

Third grade students who are working on fluency are reading a variety of folktales as plays including Little Red Riding Hood, Stone Soup and The Ugly Duckling. After a lot of practice, students perform the plays for their classmates.

Fourth grade students are working hard on building vocabulary skills and reading comprehension through guided reading and independent silent reading activities focusing on the main idea, details and making inferences. The skill of understanding the main idea is are reinforced with the Main Idea Game which requires the students to read a short selection and identify the main idea in order to advance on the gameboard.

During the month of October, students have read and discussed Halloween stories as well as Halloween plays. Students are having fun while learning!
