One reason orchestra members sit or stand in certain places is because of how loud their instruments are.

Musicians in the strings sit closest to the conductor. They sit in pairs and share a music stand. They are the largest section of an orchestra.

Most of the percussion instruments stand in the back because they have the loudest instruments.
