ROUND ONE

What was the name given to the 800 year quest to drive the Moors (Muslims) out of Spain, ending in victory in 1492? (CH1)

A: Reconquista

BONUS ROUND ONE

What is the name of the conquistador who conquered the Aztecs after he and his men were mistaken for being gods? (CH1)

A: Hernan Cortes

ROUND TWO

In 1620, the first group of Pilgrims immigrated to the shores of North America and settled which colony? (CH3)

BONUS ROUND TWO

Name the "sea dog" whose skills as a pirate made him the queen's favorite, and the Spaniards' worst enemy. (CH2)

A: Sir Francis Drake

ROUND THREE

What was the name of the Indian tribe who established tense relations with the settlers of Jamestown? (CH2)

A: Powhatan

BONUS ROUND THREE

Persecuted in Europe, this religious group were pacifists who believed in equality and toleration of others. (CH3)

A: Quakers

A: "City Upon a Hill"

This nickname applies to John Winthrop's vision for a model community in the New World whose moral practices would rival any corrupt city in Europe. (CH3)

ROUND FOUR

BONUS ROUND FOUR

The name of the Indian uprising by the Pueblo people of the Southwest, who by the 1680's had successfully removed the Spanish from New Mexico (for a short time). (CH1)

A: Pope's Rebellion

ROUND FIVE

Name a joint stock company that engaged in colonization during this time period. (CH2)

A: Virginia Co, Massachusetts Bay Co, Dutch East/West India Co

BONUS ROUND FIVE

This individual's development of tobacco as a viable cash crop greatly improved the fortunes of Jamestown. (CH2)

A: John Rolfe

ROUND SIX

This is recognized as the first establishment of democratic principles in the New World. It served as a basic inspiration to the US Constitution. (CH3)

A: Mayflower Compact

BONUS ROUND SIX

Roger Williams, who had dissented from Massachusetts Bay Colony, established this colony known for its religious toleration. (CH3)

A: Rhode Island

ROUND SEVEN

The capital of the colony of New Netherlands, it was established on the island of Manhattan after its purchase from the Indians. (CH3)

A: New Amsterdam



The Middle Colonies were sometimes known as the _____ colonies, due largely to their chief economic output. (CH7)

A: "Breadbasket"

ROUND EIGHT

Settled throughout the American Southwest, these Spanish churches were largely responsible for the spread of Spanish culture. (CH1)

A: Missions

BONUS ROUND EIGHT

This explorer is credited as the first European to circumnavigate the globe (though it was his crew who finished the journey, not him). (CH1)

A: Ferdinand Magellan

ROUND NINE

The name given to one of the most awesome war fleets ever assembled, which, in 1588, had failed to conquer England . (CH2)

A: Spanish Armada

BONUS ROUND NINE

This incident in Jamestown was caused by civil disorder on the part of poor colonists; but it was the local Indians who were most affected. (CH4)

A: Bacon's Rebellion

ROUND TEN

Queen Elizabeth I left the throne with this unique nickname, which showed adoration for her leadership (even if it may have been untrue). (CH2)

A: "Virgin Queen"

BONUS ROUND TEN

Sir Walter Raleigh returned to this site that he had left behind on the shores of North Carolina, only to find nothing remained. (CH2)

A: Roanoke

MONEY SHOT ROUND

Rules:

Option 1 (Sabotage)

- Agent gets 3 shots, each score removes 1 pt from resident team

Option 2 (Gamble)

Team may risk their own pts for up to 3 shots, each risked shot loses 1
pt, but has potential to be worth 3 pts if scored

Each team can exercise one of the above options in this round.

ROUND ELEVEN

The agreement, as established by the Pope, which split New World discoveries between the Catholic allies of Spain and Portugal. (CH1)

A: Treaty of Tordesillas

BONUS ROUND ELEVEN

This represents the name given to the spread of crops, animals, technology, and disease between the Old World and the New World. (CH1)

A: Columbian Exchange

ROUND TWELVE

1739 was the year of this slave uprising in South Carolina, from which the fear that blacks were beginning to outnumber whites led to harsh slave codes. (CH4)

A: Stono Rebellion

This religious group are often dubbed as 'hypocrites' due to their religious intolerance and strict moral lifestyle. (CH2)

BONUS ROUND TWELVE

A: Puritans

ROUND THIRTEEN

Her practice of reading the Bible on her own instead of attending church got her banned from Massachusetts Bay. (CH3)

A: Anne Hutchinson

BONUS ROUND THIRTEEN This Spanish priest aided in the abolition of encomienda when he wrote his essay entitled A Short Account of the Destruction of the Indies in 1542. (CH1)

A: Bartolome de las Casas

ROUND FOURTEEN

He did not profit off of his own colony, but this individual established religious toleration; evident to this day in the nickname for Philadelphia. (CH3)

A: William Penn

What the Spanish explorer/adventurers were called throughout the 16th century. They pursued God, gold, and glory. (CH1)

BONUS ROUND FOURTEEN

A: Conquistadores

ROUND FIFTEEN

The Indian chief Squanto may have been the initiator of a generous donation of food and supplies to the starving Pilgrims, commemorated in this celebration. (CH3)

A: Thanksgiving

BONUS ROUND FIFTEEN

Split between his buddies Carteret and Berkeley, this colony was established by the Duke of York and originally divided into East and West. (CH3)

A: New Jersey
