Literary Terms

Personal Narrative:

It's a story from the author's life It has a beginning, middle, and end. The author zooms in on a small moment and stretches it out with details

Fiction:

Any story made up by an author. A creation of the author's imagination.

Non-fiction:

one that tells you facts and information about the world around you.

Secondary characters:

those in our stories who play a significant role, appear in multiple scenes, but who are not the main focus of the primary plot.

Literary Terms Cont...

Theme: a big idea that exists throughout a book

Dialogue:

what the character said to the person he or she met, how the person responded-uses quotation marks ""

Metaphor:

It suggests what something is like by comparing it with something else **Example: I told you a million times!**

Simile:

way of describing something by comparing it to something else using 'like' or 'as', usually in an interesting or imaginative way. **Example: She is sweet as pie!**

Personal Pronouns A noun:

shows the person or people speaking being spoken to or being spoken about

without naming that person or people

Person or thing spoken about	he, she, it, him, her	they, them

Descriptive Writing Tips....

- 1. Use figurative language: such as: simile, metaphor, & onomatopoeia
- 2. Use SPECIFIC adjectives and nouns and STRONG action verbs

3. Organize your details- think of the order of:

- chronological (time)
- spatial (location)
- o order of importance

Example: writing about a person might begin with a physical description, followed by how the person thinks, feels and acts.

4. Use your 5 Senses!

- Sight: Describe: appearance, size, color, shape?
- **Sound:** Volume, pitch, tone, onomatopoeia
- Smell: Aroma, odor, scent, fragrance?
- Taste: FLAVORS!: sweet, savory, sour, etc...
- Feel: rough smooth, squishy, silky?

Give Suggestions:




Correction Advice:


kindly give advice where you think they can make their writing better: with grammar, punctuation, capitalization
