
## BRITISH ACT TO TAX COLONISTS The Stamp Act of 1765

Colonists had to pay taxes, represented by a stamp. They taxed papers, documents, and playing cards.




### BRITISH ACT TO TAX COLONISTS The Tea Act of 1773

**Colonists were** forced to pay a tea tax. They were not allowed to buy tea from anyone other than the British East India Company.




