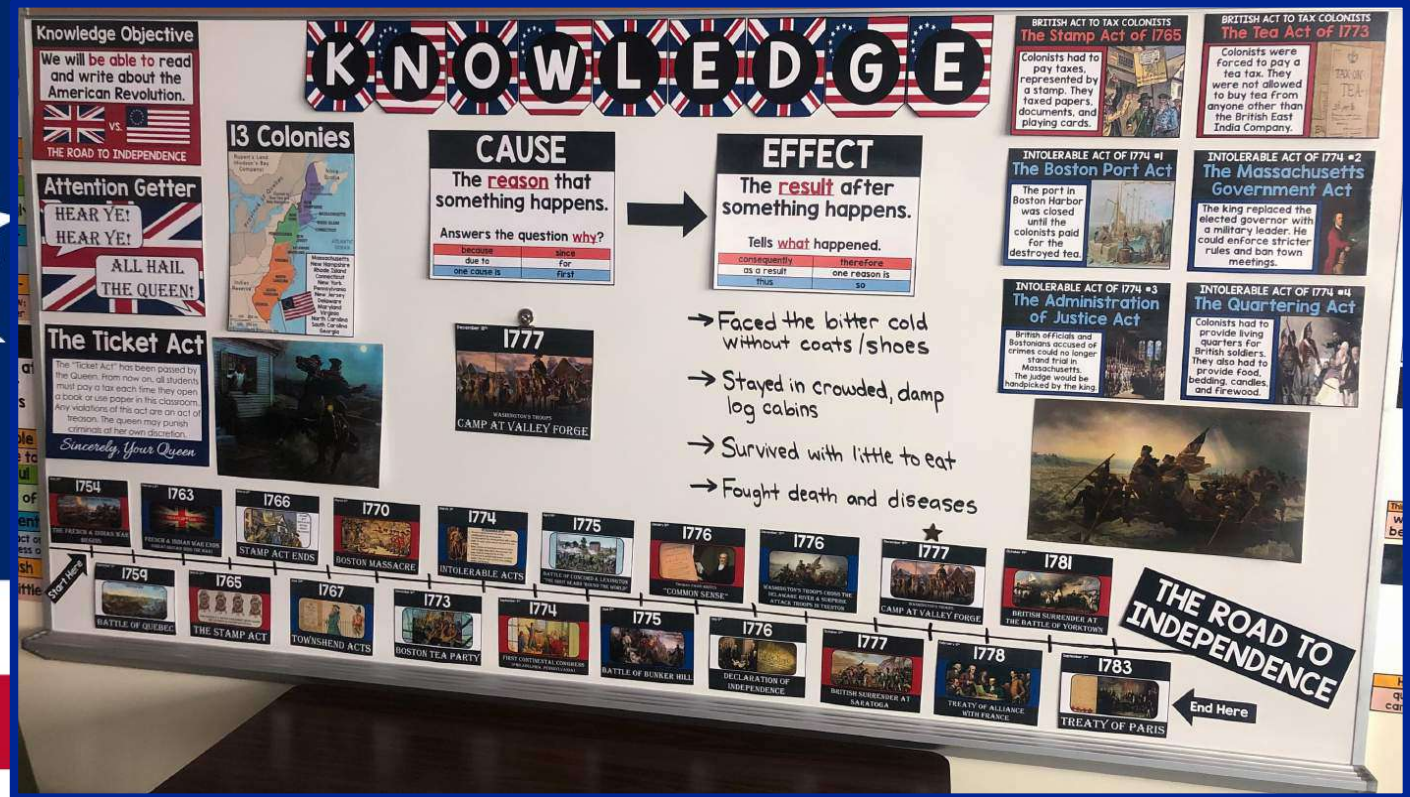

**BRITISH ACT TO TAX COLONISTS The Stamp Act of 1765**  
Colonists had to pay taxes, represented by a stamp. They taxed papers, documents, and playing cards.

**BRITISH ACT TO TAX COLONISTS The Tea Act of 1773**  
Colonists were forced to pay a tea tax. They were not allowed to buy tea from anyone other than the British East India Company.

**INTOLERABLE ACT OF 1774 #1 The Boston Port Act**

**INTOLERABLE ACT OF 1774 #2 The Massachusetts Government Act**

## The Stamp Act of 1765

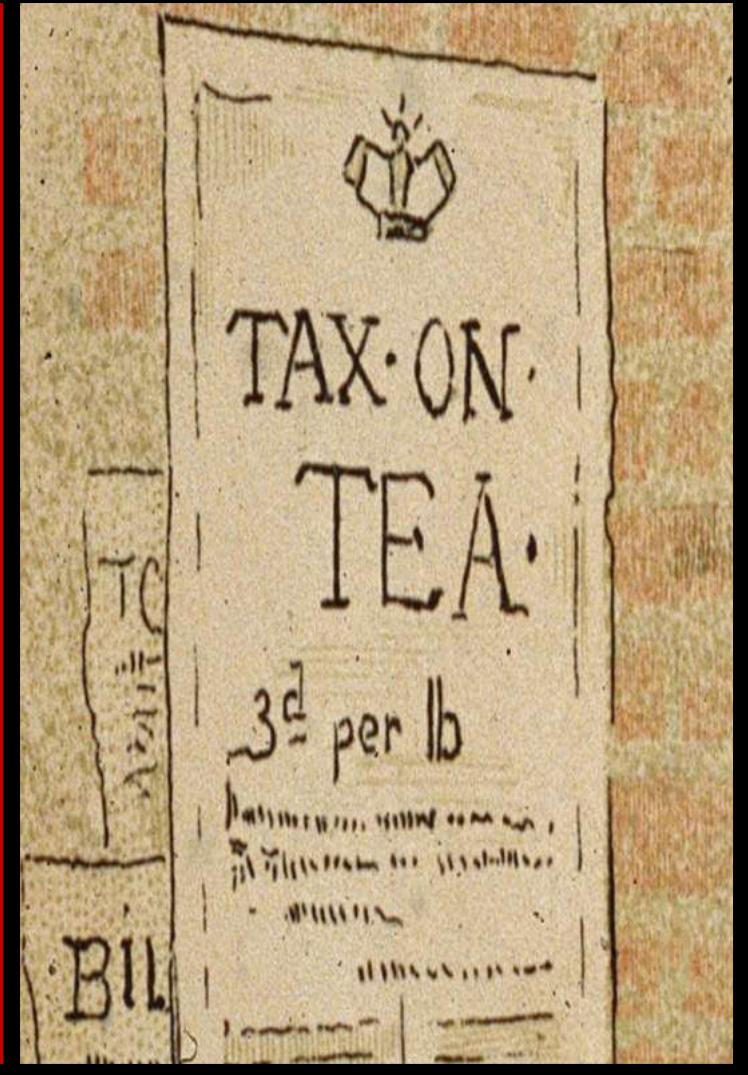
Colonists had to pay taxes, represented by a stamp. They taxed papers, documents, and playing cards.

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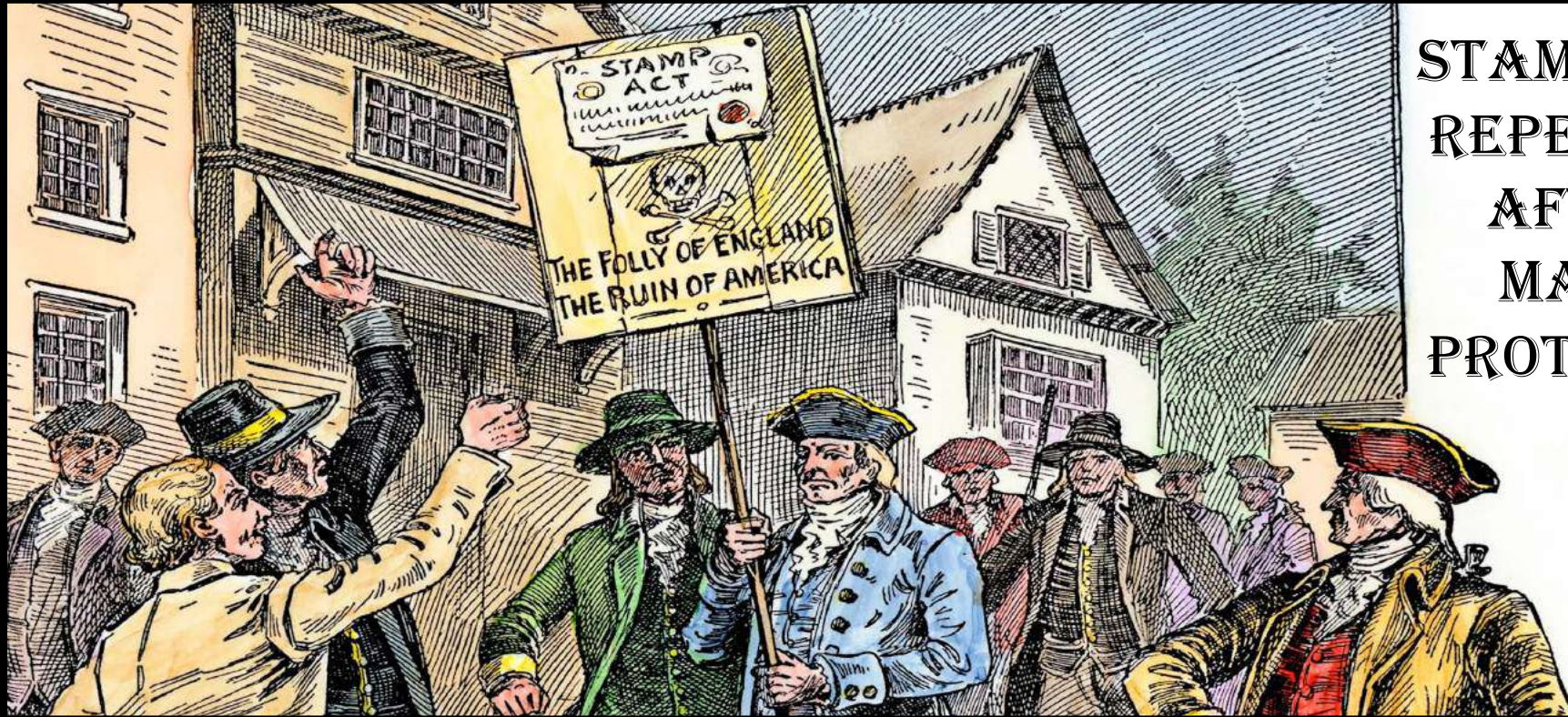

Article 10.<sup>th</sup>

The solemn Ratifications of the present Treaty, expected in good time, shall be exchanged between the contracting Parties in the Space of Six Months or sooner if possible to be computed from the Day of the Signature of the present Treaty. The Witnesses of the said Ratifications shall be in their Names and in Virtue of our Full Powers signed with our Hands the present Definitive Treaty, and caused the Seals of our Arms to be affixed thereto.

DONE at Paris the third Day of September 1783.
