Essential Questions	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Who were the Greek and Roman Heroes?
Essential Knowledge	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Hercules, Peresus, Theseus, and Jason were the most famous of the heroes. The stories of their deeds are told in manageable Latin by Roman authors.
