## Farmington Public Schools eliminates Pay to Participate Fees starting with the 2023-24 school year

It is with great enthusiasm that Farmington Public Schools (FPS) announces the elimination of Pay to Participate fees for families within Farmington Public Schools. This move will save families up to the cap of \$700 per year.

"We see this as one more step to eliminate barriers for students to be able to participate in the athletic program during their time in Farmington Public Schools," stated Superintendent Christopher Delgado. "We know that when students are connected to their schools through extracurricular activities, they perform better academically."



"We thank all of our families who have contributed to the athletic program over the years through the Pay to Participate program as it helped the district through some tough economic times," added Delgado.

"Participation in school athletic programs teaches life-long skills of collaboration, persistence, hard work, and commitment. As an athletic department, we are thrilled that the ability to pay the participation fee will no longer present a barrier for students who may otherwise be willing to participate and take a risk," stated Thomas Shelton, FPS Director of Athletics and School Safety.

"I sincerely believe that this will allow more students to fully participate in our athletic programs, ultimately benefiting them as individuals as well as our FPS community," added Shelton. "We are proud to be among only a few in the County who will not require Pay to Participate fees."

## **District launches refreshed Vision and Mission Statements**

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

## Jennifer Kaminski selected as the 2022-23 Oakland County Business Administrator of the Year

Jennifer Kaminski, assistant superintendent of business services for Farmington Public Schools, has been named the 2022-23 Oakland County School Business Administrator of the Year. The Oakland County School Business Officials (OCSBO) announced this at their Friday, May 19 meeting at Oakland Schools.

Annually, since 1998, the Oakland County School Business Officials have awarded the Business Administrator of the Year Award to a local education leader demonstrating outstanding accomplishments, dedicated years of service, and commitment to excellence in furthering the field of school business management.

"I had the pleasure of working with Ms. Kaminski while she served as the OCSBO president during the 2009-10 school year. She has displayed all the qualities of an effective leader and does not hesitate to help others when they need assistance," said Jason Zirnis OCSBO president. "I was honored to be the individual presenting this award to a genuinely great recipient."

"Jennifer's commitment to Farmington Public Schools is deeper than a job," said Farmington

Public Schools' Superintendent Dr. Christopher Delgado. "She grew up here, lives with her husband and five dachshund dogs, and raised her daughter here. Jennifer Kaminski is a homegrown talent who continues to serve with integrity and commitment to students."

Kaminski has served **Farmington Public Schools** since 2002 when she was hired as the supervisor of

finance. Since then, she has been promoted to director, chief financial officer, and currently serves as assistant superintendent of business services.

Some of her major accomplishments while serving Farmington Public Schools include:

- Modernizing Farmington's budgeting process to better meet building administrators' needs. For years, FPS has allocated building budgets solely on a per-pupil basis. Recognizing that most of our buildings have lost enrollment recently, Jennifer has worked to maintain building budgets rather than reduce them.
- Developed conversations with principals around budgeting specifically to building needs, resulting in funds being allocated for staff professional development or office equipment replacement, while continuing to satisfy the instructional needs of FPS students.
- Spearheaded an effort to provide an authentic learning experience for high school students in CTE, Algebra 2, and AP Economics classes to participate in a live viewing of Farmington Public Schools second series bond sale. This viewing was preceded by a class lesson

explaining what a bond is, and how bonds are sold, and provided an opportunity for students to interact with industry professionals.

Kaminski is a Summa Cum Laude graduate of the University of Michigan, earning her Bachelor of Business Administration in Accounting. She also passed her Certified Public Accountant exam on her first

Dick Tupper was a dedicated community servant who inspired others to give of their time to better the lives of people in need. He gave countless hours of his time to numerous organizations in our area, particularly the Farmington Area Goodfellows. He had the vision to create Neighborhood House as a year-round resource for Farmington/Farmington Hills families in need. After more than 30 years, his vision is still in operation.

Teresa Barrick exemplifies the spirit and commitment that Dick Tupper brought to our community. Teresa worked for Farmington Public Schools for 27 years before retiring in 2022. From 2014 to 2023 she served as the clerk in the Homeless Department helping families in need.

Since her retirement she has volunteered to support Operation Common Good which was established in 2004 by students in the district to ensure that ALL students in our schools receive the experiences that their classmates get to participate in and that they deserve. The stu-

dents and families helped by OCG are working with limited resources or dealing with poverty and/or homelessness. In addition to the burden of poverty, these students are dealing with the added challenge of having classmates from much more affluent households.

In 2018, Teresa was selected as the Farmington Public Schools' Support Person of the Year and then went on to be selected as the Oakland County Support Person of the Year.

"We are honored to present this award to Teresa," stated Barbara Tupper Dresden, President of Neighborhood House. "She truly demonstrates a passion to serving those in our community."

"We look forward to our continued partnership with Operation Common Good," she added.

## **School Safety Update**

In FPS, the safety and well-being of our staff and students are paramount. We are proud of the steps that we have taken in infrastructure and training to keep everyone safe, and are committed to continual planning, in partnership with law enforcement officials, to enhance safety and security in our buildings.

This summer, we have worked with vendors to install a patterned window film in all of our buildings. In our classrooms, this film is designed to mitigate the danger of a potential intruder by preventing individuals from seeing in, while allowing teachers to see out. Additionally, we are installing a patented bullet resistant window film in strategic locations identified by law enforcement at all of our schools and buildings. All school hallways are currently going through a process of color and letter coding so that our local first responders can become more familiar with our buildings, and so they are able to more effectively and efficiently respond to a potential issue. All of these infrastructure improvements have come about through our close collaboration with local law enforcement.

In the meantime, we would like to share some reminders for our families and our students as we prepare for the coming school year:

- All visitors to any school building must sign in and secure a visitor badge.
- OK2SAY is a program managed by the Michigan State Police, allowing anyone in our community to anonymously report tips related to school safety. Students can call 8-555-OK2SAY (855-555-2729); Text 652729 (OK2SAY); Email ok2say@mi.gov.
- Please remind students of the importance of keeping buildings secure by not propping open exterior doors, and never opening a door to allow someone else access to the building.

#### What's New?

#### **Tutoring – Club Z**

The After School Program provides professional tutoring through their partnership with Club Z. These services are on-site during the program hours to assist students who need help with homework or preparing for tests.

#### **Hawk Half Days**

Half days will be held at the Hawk Community Center. Participants must be program members. Half-days include a pool and pizza party. Youth members will be bused from their school to the center. Early registration is at a discounted price of \$10 and includes two slices of pizza, pop, and pool party activities. Fee increases to \$20 if registering one week or less prior to the event.

## Free Meals for 2023-24

The State of Michigan's budget includes FREE meals for all Michigan public school students in the grades Pre-K through 12 for the 2023 - 2024 school year. Students are entitled to one free breakfast and one free lunch per school day, free of charge. Students MUST take a fruit or vegetable with their breakfast and/or lunch entree for the meal to qualify as a complete meal and be FREE. Additional entrees will be charged \$2.35-\$3.35.

The first day of breakfast will be on Monday, August 28, 2023. Lunch will begin on Tuesday, August 29, 2023. Menus will be posted on the District's website under the Nutrition Services link and on each school's web page.

#### **Free/Reduced Price Meal Applications**

Although families won't have to pay for meals, families are still encouraged to complete a free/reduced meal application to help the district secure additional funding for the district's educational programs. Families who also complete the Sharing programs page, may qualify for additional benefits such as test fees waived, summer EBT benefits, community outreach programs, etc.

Families may complete their Free/Reduced-price meal application at https://farmington. familyportal.cloud or submit a hard copy. Hard copies may be printed from the District's website or copies may be picked up at each school's main office. Parents will be notified by email or mail whether or not the child qualifies. Please allow 10 working days to receive a confirmation letter.

### **Ala Carte Purchases**

Secondary schools will begin selling a la carte purchases on September 5, 2023. Elementary schools will not sell ala carte purchases or 2nd entrees until further notice.

### **Online Payments for Ala Carte Purchases**

Parents/guardians can make payments online for ala carte purchases using credit or debit cards or by e-checks at https://farmington.familyportal.cloud. Online payments are preferred, but checks are also accepted. Please make checks payable to Farmington Public Schools with your child's name and their ID number in the memo section of the check. There is a \$20 fee for returned (NSF) checks or returned e-checks for any reason. Be very careful entering your account numbers.

## Charging

Students are not allowed to charge ala carte purchases. Students must have funds in their meal account to make ala carte purchases.



#### **Meal Account History**

Parents may also view meal purchases at https://farmington.familyportal.cloud. Low balance notifications will be emailed once a student's account falls below \$5.00. Students with a negative balance will be notified via email and a phone call.

#### **Allergies**

A Request for Special Dietary Needs Form must be completed to make dietary substitutions for medical conditions and must be signed by a doctor. The form can be found and printed from the Nutrition Services web page under the food allergy tab. Please allow two weeks for review and implementation.

#### **Nutrition Services Bad Debt Policy**

Bad debt incurred through the inability to collect lunch payment from students is not an allowable cost chargeable to Nutrition Services. Any related collection cost, including legal cost, arising from such bad debt after they have been determined to be uncollectible are also unallowable. Bad debt is uncollectible/delinquent debt that has been determined to be uncollectible by the end of the school year in which the debt was incurred. If the uncollectible/delinquent debt cannot be recovered by the Nutrition Services Department in the year when the debt was incurred, then this is classified as bad debt. Once classified as bad debt, the General Fund, or other local funds, will reimburse the Nutrition Services Fund for the total amount of the bad debt. Once the uncollectible/delinquent debt charges are converted to bad debt, records relating to those charges will be maintained in accordance with the record retention requirements in 7 CFR 210.9(b) (17) and 7 CFR 210.15(b). The Business Office shall pursue collection efforts pertaining to the bad debts subsequent to the close of each fiscal year.

## **Homeless Assistance McKinney Vento Act**

**Early Childhood Center** 

Homeless children have the right to attend their school of origin (school of last attendance when the family became homeless), if feasible, or enroll in the district where the family is currently residing. There can be no barriers to enrollment. Homeless children have the same rights to education and participation in school programs as resident students. In determining eligibility for athletics, the District follows the MHSAA (Michigan High School Athletic Association)

rules in all situations. MHSAA has applications for Homeless Youth and Unaccompanied Homeless Youth to waive waiting periods for transfer students to play on high school sports teams.

### **Personal Property Liability**

Farmington Public School District and its staff are NOT liable for damage to or loss of personal property of students. It is suggested that items brought to school by your child and deemed by you to have substantial value be insured separately on your homeowner's policy.

#### **Returned Check Policy**

If restitution is not made on a check returned by the bank for any reason, the District will no longer accept checks from that individual. If two returned checks are received from the same individual, the District will no longer accept checks from that individual even if restitution has been made. The District's returned check fee is \$20.00.

#### **Student Medical Insurance**

We wish to emphasize that Farmington Public Schools does NOT provide any type of health or accident insurance for injuries incurred by your child at school. Since children are particularly susceptible to injuries, we encourage you to review your present health and accident insurance program to determine if your coverage is adequate.

If you do not feel your insurance is adequate because of a deductible or co-insurance clause or if you do not have insurance, we encourage you to review the voluntary student insurance program offered by Student Assurance Services. This plan will provide benefits for medical expenses incurred because of an accident. An explanation of the cost and benefits is explained on their website (www. sas-mn.com). The program is administered by Student Assurance Services, Inc. of Stillwater, Minnesota. Student Assurance Services can be reached at (800) 328-2739. The enrollment form and claim form are also available on their website.

## Student Count Day is October 4

"Count Days" are critical to our school district because our funding is directly connected to the number of students who are in school on the two count days in Michigan. This year, count days are set for Wednesday, October 4, 2023 and Wednesday, February 14, 2024.

Please make every effort to have your child in school on these days. If possible, please make doctor or dentist appointments another day. Thank you for your assistance in making our "Count Days" a success.



## **Athletic Program Procedures**

Farmington Public Schools is proud of our strong athletic programs, and recognizes the value of both athletic participation and student involvement in events. Students are encouraged to actively participate in events, whether as participants or spectators, while demonstrating school pride and good sportsmanship.

#### **Event Procedures**

- NO backpacks or large bags are allowed entry. Smaller bags are subject to search by school personnel.
- Outside food or beverages are not permitted. Sealed water bottles are acceptable.
- There is no re-entry for any reason, once a patron leaves the facilities.
- Ticket sales stop, and gates close for entry, at the beginning of the fourth quarter.
- Event staff reserves the right to eject spectators for any reason. Examples of behavior that could lead to ejection include:
  - Unsportsmanlike conduct
  - Disrespectful or disorderly conduct toward coaches, officials, or teams
  - Unwillingness to follow staff directives



#### Fees

The Board of Education has adopted a plan for the 2023/2024 school year to completely fund the athletic programs in grades six through twelve, thus eliminating the previous "Pay To Participate" fee. Several high school sports have separate booster fees to cover supplemental expenses, such as tournament participation, facilities fees, and other items.

It is the strong desire of the District that ability to pay fees should not be a barrier to participation for any student athlete. Requests for assistance should be directed to the building principal, or district athletic director Tom Shelton.

### **Transportation**

Based on coach/program requests, the District will make every effort to secure transportation to "Away" athletic contests. Sometimes, however, the timing of events and the availability of district buses and charter companies make this difficult, if not impossible. In some situations, families may be asked to provide transportation or carpool when transportation cannot be arranged.

### **Ticket Prices (Admission)**

- Admission for all athletic events will be \$5 for adults and \$4 for students and seniors.
- District and state tournament admission fees are set by the state, and are not covered by district athletic passes.
- Athletic Event Passes
- Both family passes and student passes are available through the North Farmington and Farmington High School main offices. Passes can also be purchased on the district website through eFunds, or at the gates for events.
- With the elimination of Pay To Participate fees, student athletes are no longer exempt from admission fees. Student athletes are encouraged to purchase either a student pass or a family pass.
- Family passes are non-transferable, and are available to families living in the same household.
- As detailed below, passes cover the entire school year, and go down in price later in the year:
  - Family Pass: \$100 if purchased in fall, \$75 if purchased in winter, \$40 if purchased in spring
  - Student Pass: \$50 if purchased in fall, \$40 if purchased in winter, \$25 if purchased in spring

## **School Bus Stops**

As a reminder, if your child is eligible for bus transportation, MiStar will have the information posted with the bus route location and times on Friday, August 25, 2023.

- Elementary bus stops will be condensed this year and we will be eliminating multiple stops within the subdivisions for efficiency purposes. Bus stops will be centrally located within a subdivision for all general education students.
- Middle school and high school bus stops remain outside the subdivisions
- All students are transported to and from their designated bus stop only.

#### **Daycare**

 Due to our buses being at capacity for the 2023-2024 school year, we can not transport to and from daycare centers.

#### **Teen Centers**

 Transportation for after school teen centers for sixth through eighth grade will be provided by the HAWK.

### **Bus Stop Relocation Request**

- The following, but not limited to, does NOT warrant a change: lack of sidewalks within the subdivision, weather conditions, family situations, i.e. daycare, bus stop is not visible from home, traffic enforcement, darkness, and the bus travels past your house.
- For those requesting a change to a student's pick-up or drop-off location, please go to the Farmington Public Schools' website, click on the transportation tab,



and fill out a Bus Stop Relocation Form and send it to the Transportation department at fpstransdept@fpsk12.net.

- Approval or denial of your request will be made by phone or mail within 10 business days.
- No relocation requests will be accepted over the telephone. All requests must be submitted between September 11, 2023 and September 29, 2023 to the Transportation Department.

#### Why are students asked to be at the bus stop early?

An important bus transportation procedure asks students to be at their designated bus stops 10 minutes before the scheduled arrival of the bus. This will ensure that your student won't miss the bus. Being in a car is NOT considered being at the bus stop.

The District understands that there may be inclement weather on some mornings and that

winter mornings can be very cold. Parents should furnish their child with an umbrella and warm clothes so they can safely wait at his or her bus stop.

In addition, a student who arrives at the bus stop after the bus door has closed cannot be allowed to board the bus. Michigan law Public Act 187 requires a school bus driver to activate the warning lights of the bus at least 200 feet before the bus stop. This is not possible once the doors have been closed.

If a student misses the bus, they will need to be driven to school. They are not permitted to go to another bus stop. It is very dangerous for parents to pull up behind the bus in the driver's blind spot causing students to run from behind the bus at the last minute with a bus driver not being able to see them and not expecting them.

Parents waiting at or near the bus stop to ensure student safety at the stop are very much welcomed and appreciated. But, parents are asked to please put their child's safety ahead of comfort and have them waiting at the stop, ready to board when the bus arrives. All buses have been equipped with cameras. Please remind your students to follow the bus rules and the directions of the driver. We want all students to have a safe environment to and from school. Failure to do so will result in disciplinary action including suspension or loss of riding privileges.

# Farmington Public Schools' eighth grade science classrooms partner with Bosch Engineers

Farmington Public Schools' (FPS) students recently partnered with Bosch engineers in our eighth grade classrooms. Power Middle School, Farmington STEAM Academy, and East Middle School science teachers had students build and test fuel cars.

During this project, Bosch engineers partnered with the teachers to deliver the lessons and help students with the entire engineering process. Each school had engineers in their classrooms five times to help the students.

The students worked in groups to create vehicles with fuel cell motors. The goal was to get their cars to drive a specific length. During this partnership, the students were fully engaged in the engineering process as they were testing and then making changes to their fuel cell motors. They would do this by taking notes based on repeated tests. Students would collect data and make changes based on that data. The Bosch engineers were working side by side with the students to help them meet their goals of making the car go a certain distance. Students were getting an understanding of how a fuel cell worked by using water to help power the motor.





"The kids loved working with the engineers and learning about fuel cells," said Michele Laramie, eighth grade science teacher at Power Middle School. "I really enjoyed how the engineers allowed the kids to trouble-shoot the car build and how to work the fuel cell."

"The kids loved doing the handson work building the fuel cells and listening to what tasks the engineers did at their jobs," said Sharon Crupi, teacher at East Middle School, "The engineers were very patient with the students. Many students were surprised at the number of different types of engineering and designs that went into certain products. They were able to see that a team working together collaboratively produced a well-constructed product."

## Farmington High School art teacher, Kimmi Dukes, named 2023 Judy White-Ora "Teaching with Heart and Soul" award winner

One of Kimmi's best attributes is her ability to encourage each student and let their lights shine.
