

The 2023/2024 FPS Teachers of the Year are Kirsten Gentry of Farmington High School, Cheryl Dalton of Warner Middle School, and Geralyn Schade of Gill Elementary School.



## High School Teacher of the Year - Kirsten **Gentry, Farmington High School**

Kirsten Gentry was nominated as High School Teacher of the Year by her colleagues, students, and FPS parents for her exceptional commitment to provide the best possible education for

students and her dedication to being a strong advocate for her colleagues.

Gentry teaches 9th grade Biology, 10th and 11th grade AP Biology, and 10th, 11th, and 12th grade Anatomy at Farmington High School (FHS). She earned her Bachelors of Science in Biology from Michigan State University and her Masters in Arts of Teaching from Marygrove College. She has been teaching for more than 20 years in various science-related subjects such as Biology, Anatomy, and Physiology.

Gentry prides herself on making sure her students are successful. She is constantly evolv-

## **Farmington Public Schools celebrates National** Reading Month with One School, One Book


In honor of National Reading Month in March, Farmington Public Schools (FPS) is celebrating with One School, One Book. All elementary schools across the District will be reading the same book at the same time. Each family with an elementary-aged student will receive a copy of the book to keep.

On weeknights, Monday through Thursday, families are asked to read a few pages of the book together. The following day at school, students will participate in trivia questions and discussions about the book. Teachers, bus drivers, principals, and other school staff are also reading the book, prompting conversation about the book at any time. Throughout the month, each school will host events, assemblies, projects, and more that go along with the theme of the book.

Leading up to One School, One Book, the students and community have been given clues hinting at the book

title via FPS social media pages. Schools will host a grand reveal of the book to their students in their own exciting way starting on Wednesday, February 28.

Gentry sets high expectations for her students to succeed and helps them achieve their goals every step of the way. She is a role model who demonstrates values of resilience, integrity, and empathy.

Not only does she promote success in her classroom, Gentry has always been active in extracurriculars as well.

Dalton teaches sixth grade ELA and Social Studies at Warner Middle School. She earned her Bachelors of Arts in Education from the University of Michigan and her Master of Arts in Reading and Language Arts from Oakland University. She has spent her entire teaching career with FPS in the Warner Middle School Building and has been teaching middle schoolers for more than 25 years.

Every day, students are excited to walk into Dalton's classroom. Her students know that they can expect something great planned for the day as she makes her lessons come alive. Her students love learning in her classroom for that reason.

"Mrs. Dalton could tell you each student's learning style and love language because she



knows them each so well," said colleague Jennifer Lilienthal. "She pushes her students to work beyond what they think they are capable of, all while creating an environment that is safe, warm, and invites learning."

Dalton's classroom environment is positive, and a safe space for students. She strives to make her classroom inclusive for all. She consciously makes an effort to include all students in every single lesson. She makes it a point to connect the curriculum to students' personal lives which keeps students engaged and wanting to learn.

"I love to do creative writing and Mrs. Dalton was always there to help me whenever I needed help, even though it was not part of her class assignments," said Savannah Sowers, a former student of Dalton's.

In the classroom, Schade has the ability to make learning fun and interactive, ensuring that each of her students feel valued and involved. Her classroom is a safe space for students where they feel comfortable to take risks, be themselves, and evolve as learners.

In her role as a resource room teacher, she looks for ways to best reach each student and help them achieve their personalized goals. She closely monitors progress to adjust her strategies as needed to make sure the students are moving in the right direction.

Schade often works with students in crisis or distress. With this, Schade has a natural calmness to her that translates to her classroom, students, and crisis situations. She has the ability to set firm boundaries while instilling a mutual sense of respect that allows her students to thrive.

Not only does Schade strive to help her students, but she also is a team player and a trusted colleague to everyone in her building.

On top of being an exceptional teacher, Schade exhibits exceptional leadership skills that extend beyond the classroom.

It's no secret that Schade is favored among her students and her colleagues. But, she is also a favorite amongst parents. She regularly makes phone calls to comfort and console worried or concerned parents, as well as to celebrate student success. She takes the time to stop and make sure that families feel heard and represented.

"We all have had that one teacher, the one we remember the most, the one that took extra interest in us, was extra kind and supportive," said Laura Sroka, FPS parent. "Perhaps, pushed us to be our better selves, even if we didn't appreciate it at the time. The one that made a difference. Geralyn Schade is that kind of teacher, and for my son and my family, she made all the difference."

For all of these reasons, she was named the FPS 2023/2024 Elementary School Teacher of the Year.

"Gerri gives 100% each day to foster a culture of excellence and encourages her students to reach their full potential," said colleague Renee Moreau-Decator. "She demonstrates kindness and empathy on a daily basis and always has a warm smile to share.

## Farmington High School named in Top 100 list of Michigan High Schools in the *U.S. News & World Report*

Farmington High School (FHS) is named in the Top 100 of Michigan High Schools with the *U.S. News & World Report* for the 2023/2024 School year. FHS is ranked 52nd within the state of Michigan, and ranked 22nd in Detroit Metro Area High Schools.

FHS is ranked 1,839 nationally with an overall score of 89.6/100. Schools are ranked on their performance on state-required tests, graduation and how well they prepare students for college.

The FHS score card includes: 43% of students taking at least one AP exam, 32% of students passing at least one AP exam, 50% mathematics proficiency, 76% reading proficiency, and a 96% graduation rate.

"I am so incredibly proud of the Farmington High School staff and students for being named by *US News and World Report* as one of the top 100 high schools in Michigan," said FHS principal Christine Meussner. "We have a dedicated, caring, and highly talented staff that has worked incredibly hard to reach this level. We also have hardworking, intelligent, kind students who make FHS a great place to learn and grow. Congratulations, FHS, for being named #52 in the state of Michigan!"

Michigan Department of Health and Human Services awards Farmington High School and North Farmington High School HEARTSafe Designation



Farmington High School (FHS) and North Farmington High School (NFHS) have both received a MI HEART-Safe School Designation. The MI HEARTSafe program is designed to ensure that schools are prepared if a sudden cardiac emergency were to occur during or after school hours. This year, a record breaking 256 schools are being recognized for their work during the 2022-2023 school year with 123 schools receiving the award for the first time, which includes FHS and NFHS.

To earn a MI HEARTSafe School designation, schools must have:

- A written medical emergency response plan and team that can respond to an emergency during school hours and after-school activities and sports.
- Current CPR/AED certification of at least 10% of staff and 50% of coaches, including 100% of head coaches and physical education staff.
- Accessible, properly maintained and inspected AEDs with signs identifying locations.
- Annual cardiac emergency response drills.
- Pre-participation sports screening of all student athletes using the current physical and history form endorsed by MHSAA.

Multiple groups, including the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), Michigan Department of Education (MDE), American Heart Association, Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA), and Michigan Alliance for Prevention of Sudden Cardiac Death of the Young (MAP-SCDY) have recognized schools that have taken the necessary steps to prepare for cardiac emergencies by awarding them with the MI HEARTSafe School designation.

FHS and NFHS were recognized in a ceremony at MHSAA in East Lansing in November.

Congratulations to both FHS and NFHS for actively ensuring our students are safe.

## **Awards & Achievements**



This is a partial list of awards and achievements of Farmington Public Schools' staff and students.

Farmington Public Schools (FPS) currently has two active middle school FIRST Tech Challenge robotics teams. The **Power Middle School (PMS)** team, the Power Hackbytes, and the **Farmington STEAM Academy (FSA)** team, the FSA Steambots, competed at the Lake Orion Qualifying event in November.

The Power Hackbytes finished the event with two wins and three losses. The FSA Steambots finished the event with a perfect record of five wins and zero loses. The Steambots earned enough points to compete in the playoffs as the 4th alliance captain, but did not beat the first alliance.

Both teams received individual awards from the judges. The Power Hackbytes team was recognized for their outstanding presentation. They earned the Judges Award. The Steambots earned second place for the Design Award. They also earned first place for the Think Award, which recognizes their engineering portfolio.

Farmington High School (FHS) students competed at the Region Eight HOSA Future Health Professionals Leadership Conference at FHS in December. There were a total of 72 Falcons that competed. Out of those 72, 45 students placed in the top seven as Finalists, while 26 students placed in the top three as medalists. All of these students are eligible to advance to the State Competition that takes place in April 2024.

Farmington High School (FHS) senior, Faylinn Wong, has earned a four-year full ride scholarship to Princeton University through QuestBridge. Faylinn was awarded her scholarship through the 2023 QuestBridge National College Match, a program that connects high-achieving high school seniors from low-income backgrounds with full four-year scholarships to 50 of the nation's best colleges.

Farmington Public Schools (FPS) hosted a successful 29th Annual Day for Strings event at North Farmington High School (NFHS). Nearly 400 orchestra students in grades 6-12 attended the event. 

## Farmington Public Schools' Kick Off to Kindergarten Registration has started

Do you have a child that is going to Kindergarten this fall? Kick off to Kindergarten is here and It is time to register your child(ren) for the 2024-2025 school year. Farmington Public Schools provides full-day Kindergarten for its families.

Kindergarten registration can occur at any time prior to the new school year, however, it is best for parents to register their child(ren) as early as possible to quarantee placement at their home school. If you are unsure of your home school, please enter your street name into the Street Guide on our website at www.farmington.k12.mi.us/street-quide.

Parents need to register their child(ren) for Kindergarten utilizing the Pre-Enrollment module on the District's website at bit.ly/FPSEnroll. To register online, parents will need a driver's license and proof of residency, such as a warranty deed, current property tax statement or lease/rental agreement with occupancy date including a list of all occupants, and any two of the following items: current gas, electric, telephone, or cable bill. Water bills do not meet the accepted criteria. Other required documentation needed is the child's birth certificate, immunization record, and a health physical form.

If you wish to enroll your child in Kindergarten, your child must be at least five years of age by SEPTEMBER 1. The birth date cut-off for a child to begin Kindergarten for the 2024-2025 school year is September 1, 2019.

## **Young 5s Program**

Farmington Public Schools is offering Young 5s programming for our youngest learners for the 2024-25 school year. This free full-day program



for families with Kindergarten-eligible students (turning 5 by December 1, 2024) who were born between June 1–December 1, 2019 may be a great option that provides extra time for their child to grow academically, socially, and emotionally.
